The Fire To-Day.

At about 12 o'clock to-day the residence of Mr. W. J. Yopp, on Fifth street, between Princess and Chestnut, was discovered on fire. The flames came from a one-story L which had been added to the original house and in which was located the dining room and two other rooms. This was entirely destroyed but the residence proper was saved. Mr. Yopp also saved all of his furniture but in a more or less injured condition. He was insured for \$700 on the house and \$100 on the kitchen, in the Phoenix, of Hartford, represented here by Mr. Norwood Giles. Mr. Yopp's policy expired yesterday but was renewed immediately. The insurance will more than cover the loss on the building. The fire is thought to have originated from a fire.

Magistrate's Court.

George Brown, charged with assault and battery on Joe Martin, both colored, was before Justice Millis today. Judgment was suspended on payment of costs. George Brown was also arraigned on a peace warrant sworn out by Joe Martin. He was ordered to pay the costs and give a bond of \$50 to keep the peace. He gave the bond and was discharged.

Supreme Court.

In this Court, on Wednesday, the consideration of appeals from the fourth judicial district was resumed and causes were disposed of as follows:

W. A. Barrett et al. vs. J. M. Henry et al., from Anson; argued by J. A. Lockhart (by brief) and Battle & Mordecai for the plaintiffs, J. D. Pemberton (by brief) and G. V. Strong for the defendants.

Ann E. George, guardian, vs. D. P. High et al., from Columbus; argued by D. J. Devane for the plaintiff; no counsel for the defendant.

Duncan Cromartie vs. Commissioners of Bladen county, from Bladen; argued by T. H. Sutton (by brief) and W. A. Guthrie for the plaintiff, and D. J. Devane and C. O. Lyon for the defendants.

Yesterday's Fire.

The alarm of fire last evening, shortly after 5 o'clock, was caused by the destruction of six small frame dwellings on Dawson, between Third and Fourth streets. The fire originated in a building owned Johnson Hooper, colored, and occupied by Henry Haskins, colored. It rapidly spread until one on the West, occupied by Amos King, colored, and the property of Johnson Hooper, was destroyed; then it spread to the East of the building in which it originated, destroying four houses, owned and occupied respectively by Frank Byran, colored, John McKinney, colored, and Mr. Henry Burnett, and one owned by Capt. W. A. Cumming and occupied by Mrs. Smith. Some of the furniture of the inmates was also lost. So far as we can ascertain by enquiries at the agencies here there was not a dollar of insurance on any of the property.

Rice Market.

TO THE REVIEW:—As many planters are not acquainted with the relative value of "rough" and "cleaned" rice it is believed that information on the subject would be useful and acceptable to them, while it will do no injustice to the pounder, mill owner and rough rice purchasers.

It is generally known that the rice market in Charleston and Savannah opened this year unusually high and as a consequence has slightly receded.

Even before the new crop began to mature prices of cleaned rice of the old crop had advanced more than one and a half cents per pound, in consequence of short stock on hand, showing clearly that last year's crop had been sold too low, or that the "bears" had depressed the market for their own benefit. It is a well known impossibility to obtain any reliable quotations of the markets for rough rice in Charleston or Savannah, especially the former. Why? Because the "cleaned" rice dealers make up the market rates, and are "bears" of rough rice, and in case of Charleston you see in the *News* and *Courier* newspaper, the same figures as prices for rough rice, that were there during the most depressed state of the market last year, while rough rice has advanced at least 25 cents. In Savannah rough rice is quoted at (tide water rice) \$1.50 to \$1.65 per bushel and it has been sold at much higher rates and 42 lbs of rice is now the legal bushel in Georgia.

Major N. O. Tilton, the most experienced rice beater and Superintendent of the large Habersham Mills in Savannah, gives the following relative values, taken from his private tables: Cleaned rice that is worth 5½ cents per lb would make rough rice from which it is pounded net \$1.40 per bushel when the yield is 20 bushels of rough to 600 lbs of cleaned rice; at 6½ cents, \$1.66 per bushel; at 7 cents, \$1.93 per bushel. This includes all expenses and as Major Tilton says is the net value of the rough rice at the mill.

The tolls for beating are nine per cent of the cleaned rice, taking that proportion of the several grades of rice and "dances" or "rice flour" &c.

From the above the planter can see about what his rice should set him when he knows the value of the cleaned rice.

The Cape Fear rice will "turnout" about 20 bushels to the cask (600 lbs.) he writer had rice pounded of the last crop in Savannah that took but 19½ bushels to the cask.
