It is curious as recalling a past age as it has been many, many years since this building was erected and the hand that made the sketch has probably long since mouldered in the grave.

Sale of Real Estate.  
The Grant property, running through from Second street to Third, along the line of Princess street, was sold to-day at auction by Mr. F. H. Darby, Commissioner, under a decree from the Superior Court. It was divided into four parcels, the house and lot corner of Second and Princess streets, two offices with premises fronting on Princess street, opposite the Court House, and the site of the burned stables, corner Princess and Third streets. Mr. Carl Mugge bought the first named house and lot, for \$4,550. Mr. L. Brown became the purchaser of the office and tract adjoining this at \$1,150; Mr. E. G. Barker bought the other office and tract for \$1,387.50, and Mr. S. Stevens, of Onslow county, purchased the stable tract for \$2,250. The entire sale realized \$9,337.50.—Terms of sale, one-third cash and balance in 6, 9, 12 and 15 months.

Free Show—No Reserved Seats.  
Mr. W. E. Crossley, agent for the third advertising brigade of Forepaugh's Show, is in the city to-day, making arrangements for a grand illuminated stereopticon exhibition to-morrow evening. Prof. Abt will entertain the spectators with a series of wonderful zoological illustrations, exhibiting many of the rare animals and birds to be seen in the great Forepaugh show, which is to exhibit here Saturday Nov. 12. The leading features of the circus will also be produced, and views of famous places, portraits of illustrious women, reproductions of works of art, views of great cities, lakes, rivers and mountains, and last, but by no means least, a full-sized view of Forepaugh's famous "Queen of Beauty," the "hand somest woman in America" will be exhibited by means of the stereopticon. It is a free show. The exhibition will be given from the balcony of the house Southeast corner of Market and Front streets, but if the weather is inclement then it will take place the following evening, commencing at 7:30 o'clock.

## Cotton in this Section.

Here are a few items, compiled from the census returns of the cotton crop, which will prove interesting to the mercantile communities: North Carolina produced last year 389,508 bales of cotton from 893,153 acres of land under cultivation. The largest cotton producing county is Wake, which raised 30,115 bales on 59,916 acres. Edgecombe is next, with 26,250 bales raised on 51,880 acres. New Hanover raised but 66 bales on 142 acres; but there is very little of New Hanover, it must be remembered, outside of the city. Anson

Brunswick, 244 bales; Columbus, 930; Cumberland, 3,905; Duplin, 4,499; Onslow, 2,841; Pender, 835; Richmond, 12,754; Robeson, 8,846; and Sampson, 6,291. Person and Surry counties raised but one bale each and it took two acres in Person to do this and three in Surry.

The Presbyterian Synod.  
Rev. C. M. Payne and Mr. John McLaurin are the only delegates from this city in attendance on the Synod of the Presbyterian Church in this State, now in session at Salisbury. The former represents the Second Church and the latter the First Church. The following are the proceedings of the first day as we find them in the Salisbury *Examiner*:  
The opening services of the Synod took place in the Presbyterian church of this city, yesterday evening. The sermon was preached by the Rev. J. Henry Smith, D. D., of Greensboro.

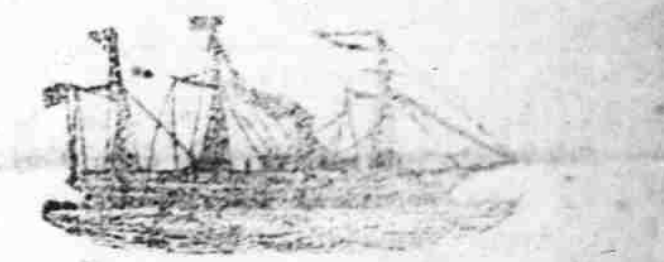
