The Sampson Fair.  
 The 17th annual Fair of the Sampson County Agricultural Association will be held at Clinton on the 16th, 17th, 18th and 19th insts. Mr. E. W. Kerr has been selected as Chief Marshal for the occasion. A large attendance is expected. Thursday will be the big day, as usual, and on that day Gov. Jarvis will be present, and will deliver an address, and Col. Polk will speak on the 18th. A fine breech-loading gun will be shot for on Thursday. The balls will be thrown from a Champion trap, the same as used at the State Fair. One of the curiosities to be exhibited is a walking cultivator, a practical curiosity, which has never before been exhibited in Sampson county. This cultivator will be sold at auction on the grounds on Thursday. Altogether, it will be a very attractive Fair. We return thanks for a cordial invitation to be present.

Sale of the Carolina Central.  
 It has been known that negotiations were on foot in New York for the sale of the Carolina Central Railroad and the REVIEW has published such information as we were able to glean on the subject. The first news of the sale, however, received here, was brought in yesterday's Charlotte Observer which reached the city yesterday afternoon. The Observer says:  
 Last Thursday the Carolina Central changed hands in New York, Mr. John M. Robinson, president of the Bay Line of steamers, the Seaboard & Roanoke, the Raleigh & Gaston and the Raleigh & Augusta Air Line railways purchasing from Mr. Murchison a controlling interest in the road. It was stated yesterday on reliable authority that the wife of Mr. Edward Matthews, of New York, who holds a large amount of stock in the road, had served out an injunction against the transfer, but it is not believed that this will do more than delay the change in the management for a short while. Those of our citizens who learned of the transfer yesterday express much satisfaction with it as it insures a competing line to the seaboard, operated by a very wealthy and powerful railroad combination. An officer of the Carolina Central in this city yesterday expressed the conviction that the new management would not continue to pool freights with the Richmond & Danville company, and in his opinion it confirmed it will result in very great advantage to Charlotte.

It was stated that the Richmond & Danville company, it will be remembered, were negotiating for this road a few days ago, and it seems that Robinson was bidding for it at the same time. The terms of the sale could not be learned from any railroad authority in the city.  
 It is understood here now that the sale has really been effected, although it is said that Capt. Murchison will retain the management and that there are guarantees in the transfer that Wilmington shall not be discriminated against. If this is so the sale or transfer of the road will have but little effect on the local business the merchants have had on the line of the Carolina Central for some years past and which, by the way, is all that they have had from that direction. It is true that the little commercial intercourse of the road with points beyond Charlotte.

Mr. Robinson is expected here tonight and we suppose that the arrangements preliminary to the transfer will be made to-morrow, when something interesting as to Mr. Robinson's intentions may transpire. We are truly sorry that Capt. Murchison was unable to retain the road in the hands of the Company. He has not been long its President but during the time that he has controlled its destinies there has been a marked improvement in almost every department. He has given freely of his valuable time and attention to this road, and it is greatly regretted that he could not push it through to the mountains. We trust that it is true that he is still to retain the management of the road.
