The Water Works.

The water was turned into the pipes from the water works yesterday and the hydrants on Front, Second and Fourth streets were fairly tested and found to work splendidly. While the operation was going on the writer hereof made a trip to Hilton, where the works are located, and during our trip gleaned the following information: The reservoir, or tank, is 70 feet high from its base, and 110 feet higher than the level of the river. It is made of sheet iron and built to contain 200,000 gallons of water which can be thrown into it by the powerful engines at the works in four hours.

The engine house, or machinery building, is a new, neat brick building, located some 50 yards from the tank, immediately upon the bank of the river. In this building are the engines and boilers, all new machinery and of the finest pattern. There are two engines for pumping water. The larger engine has an 18 inch cylinder with a 10-inch stroke and is capable of pumping one million of gallons of water a day.
