A Dispute About a Lottery Ticket.
A special dispatch from Helena, Ark., says: Night before last (Oct. 3d.) an attempt was made to assassinate Simon Silverman while on his way to this city. Five shots were fired at him from behind a tree, with no other effect than to frighten the horse ridden by Silverman, which threw its rider without injuring him. The cause of the attempt on Silverman's life is the legal dispute now before the New Orleans courts about the ownership of the lottery ticket which won the \$15,000 prize in the Louisiana State Lottery, Silverman claiming it to be his, and a Mrs. Clark claiming that it had been purloined from her. The ticket was taken from him at the muzzle of a pistol, and he has instituted suit for the money. It is supposed that the attempt on his life was made to keep him from prosecuting the suit.—New Orleans Picayune, Oct. 19.

Look for Meteors.

Some very handsome meteors have been seen in the heavens recently, and, though the present is not considered a good year for meteors, yet watchers who stay out of bed long enough o' nights may witness enough of these strange lights to reward them for their trouble. The meteor period is 33 years. The latest remarkable apparition of them was in 1866, and the two latest before that were in 1833 and 1799—all occurring between the 12th and 14th of November, a circumstance which has given the November meteors an assured position in the circle of celestial regularities.

Proceedings of the Ladies Benevolent Society.

The annual meeting of the Ladies' Benevolent Society, postponed from last week, was held, as previously announced, in Hook and Ladder Hall, on Tuesday, 15th inst. The opening prayer by Rev. Dr. Payne was followed by a short, impressive and highly appreciated address from the same reverend gentleman. The assemblage was far smaller than had been hoped for, from fifteen to twenty ladies only being present. The President's report, with statements from the Secretary and Treasurer, showed that the Society had expended during the year more than \$300 in the purchase of wood, molasses, meal, meat, flannels, shawls, blankets, and sometimes shoes, &c., for distribution among those needing aid. Several donations from a club of young ladies and gentlemen meeting periodically for social enjoyment were thankfully received and appropriated. The members holding office during the preceding year were re-elected, and the list of visitors was revised, but not completed. The ladies agreed each to use greater efforts to diffuse a more general interest in the work of the Society, its funds depending far too small for the indispensable claims of our suffering poor. The members entreat their sisters of Wilmington each to lend a helping hand, that all may, with one heart and soul, prove their sympathy with the distressed by bestowing, as the Lord has blessed them, and thus win His approving word, "He that giveth to the poor lendeth to the Lord." Attention is also called to another branch of the Society's work—The Old Ladies' House of Rest, on Seventh street—where four or five aged and worthy ladies are provided with rooms free of rent. It is earnestly hoped that the Society may obtain such an increase of funds as to enable it to enlarge operations there, so that food, as well as shelter, may be furnished.

The Cape Fear.

There are no Fayetteville steamers here to-day. The Worth is expected to-night, she having left Fayetteville yesterday at 1 o'clock. It is her first trip with freight since having been rebuilt.

In speaking yesterday of the river steamers here it was indirectly stated that those in port then were the first arrivals from Fayetteville in many weeks, which was of course incorrect.

A Singular Occurrence.

A singular accident, fortunately without serious results, took place yesterday morning at the freight office of the Wilmington, Columbia & August R. R. in this city. A young gentleman was in the office at the time and leaned with one arm on one of the open doors of a large iron safe, when it (the door) gave way suddenly and fell to the ground. There were several standing near at the time but fortunately no one was injured. The door which fell weighs about three hundred pounds. The safe is a very large one and has been in use many years and it is thought that an original flaw in the door had gradually been enlarged each time it was opened or closed until at last it gave way.

The Water Works Test.

On account of the blowing out of a plug at Castle and Fourth streets, there was some delay in getting ready for the trial announced to take place to-day. At Red Cross and Fourth streets a hose was attached to the hydrant on the sidewalk, which led to a post fixed in the centre of the street, to which the pipe was securely fastened. At 3:30 o'clock, precisely—under the supervision of Capt. E. W. Manning, of the city fire department, the water was let on by members of the Little Giant Steam Fire Engine Company, and at the expiration of three minutes the stream had reached an altitude of 69 feet above the level of the street, and at the expiration of seven minutes a height of 74 feet had been attained. Fortunately there was but very little breeze to disturb the water, and no difficulty was experienced in determining the height of the stream. The experiment was entirely successful, and was far more satisfactory than the lookers-on anticipated. We were obliged to leave before the test was concluded, but we saw enough to be satisfied that the trial will prove an entire success.
