

River News.
The steamer North State arrived here
Saturday night. The D. Murchison
arrived Sunday evening. Both boats had
very heavy freights. They report the
Wave as at Cypress, on the way down,
detained by one of her flats having be-
come snagged in her bows. She will
probably reach here to-night. At last
reports the water was falling off very
fast, and it is hardly probable that the
boats which left here this afternoon will
get further than the Shoals unless there
has been considerable rise in the river
within a day or two.

The receipts of cotton at this port this
week foot up 8,639 bales, against 6,910
bales for the corresponding week of last
year, a gain for this year of 1,729 bales
which is a handsome showing.

No entertainments are booked for the
Opera House until December 8th and
9th with a matinee on the 10th, at which
Prof. Pharazon, the magician, will make
his first appearance before a Wilmington
audience. And that, so far as we are in-
formed, will be the last until sometime
in January, 1882.

The Water Works.
The announcement is made officially
that the Clarendon Water Works
Company is now ready to receive applica-
tions for supplying water. Mr. John C.
Chase, the Superintendent, has an office in
No. 1 Journal Building, where he will be
found from 9 to 11 A. M. and from 3
to 5 P. M. The pipes will be laid in the
order in which applications are received.
The Company have generously agreed
to furnish those living along the lines of
the mains, and whose cisterns or wells
may be dry, with water from the hy-
drants free during the present dry spell.

Williams & Murchison; Nor. barque
Jens Wilson, Berg, for Liverpool, with
1,359 bales cotton, shipped by Messrs
Williams & Murchison; Nor. barque
Albeona, Beruldsen, for Havre, with
1,430 bales cotton, shipped by Messrs
Russell & Potter; and schr. Alpha, Sal-
isbury, for Jeremie, Hayti, with 25,000
brick, 50,000 shingles and 85,879 feet
lumber, shipped by Messrs Northrop &
Cumming.

Farewell Services.
Large audiences assembled at the
Front Street M. E. Church, yesterday
morning and evening, to hear the fare-
well sermons of Rev. Dr. Yates, the pas-
tor. Dr. Yates has filled the pulpit at
Front Street for four years, and it is not
probable that he will be again returned
to it by the Conference. His pastorate
has been marked by a warm attachment
between the pastor and his congregation,
and has also been marked as a period
during which large accessions have been
made to the church membership. The
knowledge that yesterday would proba-
bly be the last time that he would
preach, at least for some years, in that
pulpit, made the sermon eloquently im-
pressive and at times very affecting to
both pastor and people.

At the Fifth Street M. E. Church
there were also large audiences in at-
tendance, as it was the last time for Rev.
Mr. Ricard, the pastor, to preach before
Conference. Whether he will be re-
turned or not cannot be known until
after Conference, but we are well
aware that his large congregation would
gladly welcome him back. He has the
earnest love of his congregation, and his
pastorate has been very successful in
adding to the membership of the church.

Whatever may be their future fields
of labor, both gentlemen may have the
satisfaction that they leave earnest and
devoted hearts who will pray for their
welfare and rejoice in their success and
happiness.
