The figure to-day was 3 per cent., and the supply was in excess of the demand. The market for govern ments was very fair, and to borrow them was a difficult matter. A close calculation makes the amount in the United States treasury jutt now available for the purchase of bonds \$50,000,000."

The advocates of rapid transit in Phildelphia are pushing their application for an elevated railroad charter before the council's committee on railaoads. Letters have been received from a number of prominent New York merchants on the line of the elevated railroads in that city, showing that the business has not been damaged in any manner from the passenger trains. Official figures are also quoted showing that the net receipts of the surface roads have largely inereased, instead of diminished, since the elevated roads were built.

A BIT OF HISTORY.

Hon. Charles Macbeth, an old and influential citizen of Charleston, and for a number of terms Mayor of that city, died on Wednesday morning, aged 77 years, having been born in Charleston in 1804. He was Mayor of the city at the close of the war in 1865. The News and Courier gives us this interesting bit of the history of the evacuation of Charleston by the Confederates and the entry of the Federal forces: Charleston had been under fire for

more than two years when the (onfeder

ate forces quietly withdrew, and the fair men. Brodie and Hester confessed the city without other head or master than the dignified gentleman who is now at rest. This had been a camp. The rank grass grew in the streets. Hurtling shells had put an end to the conduct of business affairs. The sword was supreme. But the end had come. Civil authority was restored, and once again Charles Macbeth, with none to dispute his authority, was Mayor of Charleston. There was not a cloud in the sky. Nature smiled while hearts were bowed down and hope was dead. Not a soldier remained. There were none to defend none to save. "Our friends the enemy" did not realize that the prize they had sought so long was at last within their grasp. The evacuation by the Confederate forces was completed on the night next day did the Federal troops take passession. Charleston, in terms, was never surrendered. Mayor Macbeth merely notified "the General "commanding the Army of the United States at Morris Island," on the morning of the 18th, as follows: "The military authorities of the Confederate States The greatest of the wheat producing have evacuated the city. I have remained to enforce law and preserve order, until you take such steps as you may think best." The missive was entrusted to 000,000; Indiana, 47,000,000; Ohio, Aldermen G. W. Williams and Gilliland and duly delivered. Learning that the United States troops were landing on Atlantic wharf, Mr. Williams went to that place and had an interview with Col. Bennett, who was there in command. Atter this interview Col. Bennett wrote a note to Mayor Macbeth, saying :-The troops under my command will render every possible assistance to your welldisposed citizens in extinguishing the fires now burning." A guard was procured to protect the mills and ware chouses containing provisions. Mayor Macbeth it was largely due that the craziness of patriotism did not find expression in wholesale burning.
