State vs. Chas. Williams, for larceny. Case continued under bond of \$100 and witnesses recognized for appearance.

State vs. F. Brown, et al, for nuisance. Nol pros, with leave.

State vs. Eli Watson, for larceny. Verdict, not guilty.

The River Free.
 The Fayetteville Examiner says that the Cape Fear Navigation Company received, a few days ago, from the U. S. Government, a check for \$10,000, the sum named in the act of the U. S. The deed of surrender has been signed, sealed and delivered, and the river is now free to all navigators and all craft from a dug-out of the size of a horse trough to the Great Easterns. We are glad that the job is over. The next thing is to increase the depth of water, which practical men say can be done. It is not probable that anything will be done in that direction until the season of low water, which may be expected during next summer.
