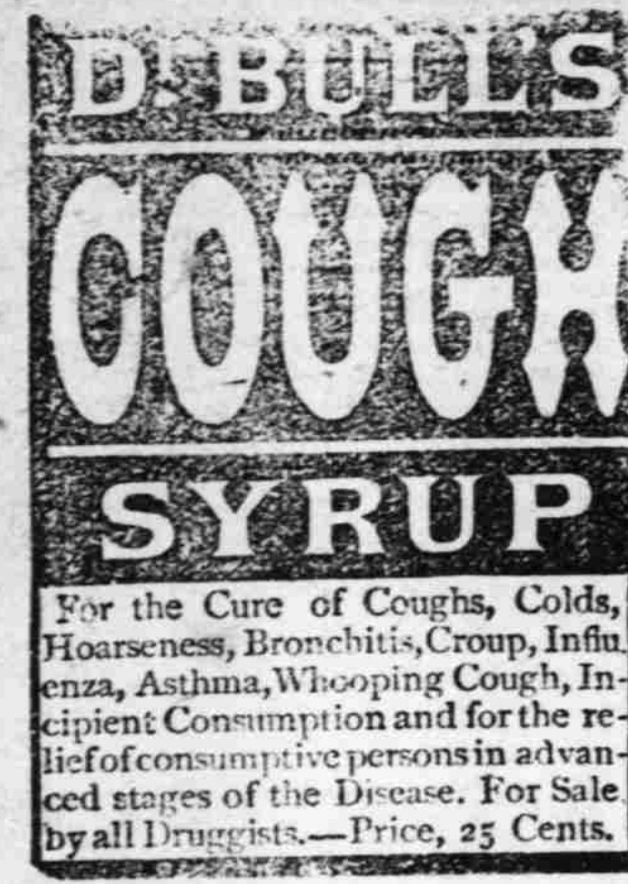


LONDON, Dec. 6, 1881.—It is probable that General Sir Evelyn Wood will be appointed Governor of Natal.
