## Twenty Eight Lives Lost

OWEN SOUND, Ont., Dec. 5-For a week past there have been fears about the propeller, Jane Miller, which left this port Friday morning, Nov. 25, and has not since been heard of. On Friday last the tug Tommy Wright went in search of her. The tug returned last night. She reports finding considerable wreckage of the Jane Miller, indicating the loss of the propeller. A number of passengers, also from Wiarton for Lion's Head to work at Watt's Mill, were on board, but their names are not known.
