**External Use of Castor Oil.**  
The London 'Medical Journal' gives reports from various practitioners who have found purgative results follow the inunction of castor oil. One writer states that he has frequently applied this oil to the abdomen, under spongipoline, or other waterproof material, in cases where the usual way of administering by the mouth seemed undesirable, and with most satisfactory consequences. In a case of typhoid fever, also, half an ounce of castor oil was applied in this manner, under a hot water fomentation, the effect of this being as represented, to relieve the constipation and tympanitic distention that had been present, without undue purging or irritation of the bowels.
