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It is now estimated that the loss of life by the burning of the Ring Theatre, at Vienna, will reach nearly 700 persons.

New York State, says the Tribune, is again under obligation to the stalwarts. They have deprived her of the Speakership of the House of Representatives.

Germany is declared to be the first nation of the world in the number of her special asylums for the relief and cure of the afflicted. For deaf mutes she has 21 asylums; for the blind, 31; for lunatics, 39, and for epileptics, 11; her total is 176.

Two members of the municipal government of Cincinnati have been indicted for bribery. An alderman and a councilman both attempted to make money by selling their votes, and were caught.

Mr. Edward McPherson, who is the new clerk of the House, is an old stager on the floor of Congress. He represented his district in Pennsylvania in the Thirty-sixth Congress, and again in the Thirty-eighth, which he filled long and acceptably.

THE MAILS.

The cotton mills of Georgia have averaged 14 per cent, on the capital invested during the past year. Yet, one Mr. Barker, all the way from Lewiston, Me., says that cotton factories cannot be made to pay in the South.

It is estimated that the number of immigrants that will make new homes in this country in the year commencing July 1st, 1881, and ending July 1st, 1882 will reach the immense total of 1,500,000.

Of these immigrants the greater portion come from Germany. About one-third are of that nationality while the principal portion of the rest are from Great Britain, and Ireland and Scandinavia.

How long this influx of foreigners to our shores will continue, it is impossible to tell, but so long as such strict military rules—rules that compel so many years of military service from every man able or liable to do service as a soldier—continues, we may expect no cessation.
