Barn and Peanuts Burned.
We learn from a friend that a barn containing 250 bushels of peanuts, in the vines, on the plantation of Dr. J. O. Shepard, at Scott's Hill, was destroyed by fire on the night of the 13th inst.—The barn was partly covered by insurance, but the peanuts, which belonged to the doctor's tenants, were uninsured. Several hundred bushels of peanuts had been stored in the barn and had only been removed the day before the fire, thus, fortunately, escaping destruction. The fire was accidental.

A Rough Passage.
Br. barque *Mary Ann*, Smith, hence, for London, has arrived at Powey, Eng., in distress and reports that she experienced a succession of heavy gales throughout the passage. On Monday, 21st ult., ship was struck by a heavy sea, which took bulwarks and main rail on both sides, the ship being on her beam-ends for several hours. All movable articles were washed off the deck and sail had to be cut away and part of the cargo jettisoned in order to lighten the ship; boats are also damaged. During the gale the mate had his collarbone dislocated and the boatswain injured from being knocked overboard and back again.

Conflagration
The barn, together with about 1,500 bushels of rice, at the *Sans Souci* plantation, belonging to Mr. John F. Garrell, was totally destroyed by fire this morning. The rice destroyed was but a small portion of the crop raised by Mr. Garrell this year; but, fortunately, the larger portion had been sold and delivered, or the loss would have been much more severe. The alarm was sounded and the fire department turned out promptly, three of the companies, the *A. Adrian*, the *Little Giant* and the *Hook and Ladder*, having got across the Fourth street bridge, when they ascertained that the fire was outside of the city limits and turned back. It is not known how the fire originated, as both Mr. Garrell and his foreman, Mr. Bray, were in the city when the alarm was given. There was insurance on the rice to the amount of \$2,000 and on the barn for \$1,000, both insured in the London Assurance, of which Mr. Samuel Northrop is the agent in this city.

Death of Mr. Plummer.
We are pained to learn that Mr. John Plummer, the venerable father of Capt. John W. Plummer, of Plummerville, Robeson county, in this State, died at his residence, at Fairbault, Minn., on the 30th ult., aged about 74 years. The immediate cause of his death was an accident which occurred to him a few days before, while crossing a street in Fairbault, at a time when a horse was being driven rapidly along the same street. He, being very deaf, did not hear the cry of warning and one of the shafts of the carriage to which the horse was attached, struck him in the head and fractured his skull, from which he never recovered, although he had the best of medical attendance.

Mr. Plummer was an Englishman by birth, but had been a resident of this country since 1851. He was the father of 16 children, 11 of whom are now living. The *Prairie Du Chem Courier*, in speaking of his death, says: "Thus passed away another good man. To know him was to respect him as a true man in every sense of the word."
