The funeral services took place at St. John's Church, of which deceased had been for many years a vestryman, and from thence to their last resting place in Oakdale followed by a large concourse of sorrowing friends and relatives. The following gentlemen were the pall-bearers, viz: Col. James G. Burr, Col. Wm L. DeRosset, and Messrs James A. Willard, Alfred Martin, B. F. Mitchell, Jas Anderson, James H. Chadbourn, Alex. Sprunt, O. G. Parsley and Jno. S. James.

The Safest Seat.  
The frequency of collisions on railroads has raised the question, which is the place of greatest security in a railroad train? The Railroad Journal gives the following as an answer: It is very well known that the car nearest the engine is exposed to the least dust, and that the rear car of a train is generally safer than the front car. The safest is probably the last car but one, in a train of more than two cars; that is, there are fewer chances of accidents to this than any other. If it is a way train at moderate speed, or any train standing still, a collision is possible from another train in the rear; in which the last car receives the first shock. Again, the engine and the front cars of a train will often run over a broken rail, or a cow, or stone, without detriment, while the last car, having nothing to draw it into the line of the train, is free to leave the track. Next to the forward car the rear car is probably the most unsafe in the train. The safest seat is probably near the centre of the last car but one, and in a very long train, in the centre of the last two or three cars next to the last.

At a joint meet of the members of the Chamber of Commerce and Produce Exchange, held at the rooms of the latter yesterday afternoon, at 5 o'clock, the first Vice President of the Chamber, Mr. E. Peschan, called the same to order and announced that it had been called to take some action with reference to the loss that has been sustained in the death of Henry Nutt, Esq., an honorary member of the Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. Alex. Sprunt moved that a committee of three be appointed to draft suitable resolutions, and the chair appointed Messrs Alex. Sprunt, C. H. Robinson and Thos. Evans said committees.

The committee retired, and, after a short absence, returned and reported as follows:  
WHEREAS, This Chamber having heard with the deepest regret of the demise, yesterday, of our highly esteemed fellow-citizen, Henry Nutt, Esq., desires to pass the following resolutions:  
Resolved, That in the death of Henry Nutt we have to mourn the loss of one of the most prominent, experienced, energetic and wise members of our Chamber and of this community, who commanded our highest respect and esteem during the period of more than half a century.  
Resolved, That we regard the death of Mr. Nutt as a great loss to our commercial interests and public improvement, in which he took the warmest interest and perseveringly promoted.  
Resolved, That whilst bowing to the will of the Most High, we shall ever cherish his memory, as one whose death we shall long deplore; whilst we seek to follow his example as a worthy, high-toned citizen and Christian gentleman.  
Resolved, That his bereaved family have our sincere sympathy and condolence under this great affliction; that a special record of Mr. Nutt's death be made by the Secretary in our minute book, and that a copy of these resolutions be sent to the family.  
It was further resolved that the members of both bodies attend the funeral, meeting at the rooms of the Exchange for that purpose one-half hour before the appointed time.  
The meeting then adjourned.
