Eggs were retailing from the stores to-day for 25 cents per dozen; grown chickens for 30 cents each, and dressed turkeys at 16½ cents to 18 cents per pound, according to quality.

Cup Pudding.

Some stale rolls, divested of crust and cut in halves. Place each half in a teacup and cover it with milk till it is soaked through. Turn it out on a plate, add a little more milk and with it jam of marmalade.

Personal.

Mr. E. A. Oldham, of the staff of the *Newbern Commercial News*, is in the city on a brief visit to relatives and friends during the holidays. He gave us the pleasure of a call this morning, and we were glad to see him looking well and hearty.

How to Make Meat Tender

Cut the steaks the day before, into slices about two inches thick, rub them over with a small quantity of soda; wash off next morning, cut into suitable thickness, and cook as you choose. The same process will answer for fowls, legs of mutton, etc. Try, all who love delicious, tender dishes of meat.

Boughouts.

One large egg, four and one-half table-spoonfuls melted butter or lard, one coffee cup sugar, one cup sweet milk, one teaspoonful ginger bought at the drug store, two of cream tartar from same place, one of soda dissolved in the milk. Mix the cream tartar with flour enough to make the dough just stiff enough to handle, fry in hot lard, take out and lay on brown paper a moment, then in a dish and grate sugar over them first on one side and then on the other; do not allow them to cool before putting on the sugar.

Nutt Street Improvements.

The improvements on Nutt street, which have been in progress for some time, under the supervision of Mr. R. H. Beery, the contractor, have been completed, and there is now an excellent thoroughfare from the foot of Mulberry street to the Carolina Central Depot, a distance of 1,750 feet. The entire distance is now laid with three-inch plank, which, from its appearance, will prove serviceable for a number of years.

Purchase Returns.

Under the laws of 1881 it will be necessary that a return of all purchases made for the six months ending December 1st be rendered before the end of the month. Privilege licenses will also have to be renewed by the 10th of next month. Necessary blanks, in which is a schedule of the returns to be made, will be furnished in due time by the Register of Deeds, and a failure to comply with the law is a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of not more than \$50, or imprisonment.

Outrageous.

Between eight and nine o'clock, last evening, a man called at the residence of one of our citizens in the Southern section of the city, and tried to create a disturbance. The husband being absent at the time, the wife shut the door in the intruder's face and would have nothing to do with him. A short time subsequently a knocking was heard at the gate and a demand made to the inmates of the house to open the door, which they, very properly, refused to do, and a moment later a pistol was fired from the outside, the bullet passing through the door and falling behind the ceiling on the opposite side of the room.

The person who first called at the door is known, but it is not yet definitely known who fired the shot.

The *Fair Journal*, the oldest paper of its kind in the State, was for sale by the newsboys and eagerly sought for by visitors.

One of the features of the evening was the voting for the gold watch and chain to be awarded to the most popular young lady. At midnight the vote stood as follows: Miss Ella Weill, 157 votes; Miss Ella Fishblate, 73; Miss M. Greenwood, 42; Miss Rosa Macks, 8; Miss E. Loeb, 1.

The vote for the gold-headed cane, to be awarded to the most popular gentleman, stood at midnight: for Major C. M. Stedman, 61; Hon. A. M. Waddell, 17; Mr. W. P. Canaday, 11.

The musical programme for the evening consisted of the following selections: "Il Trovatore," duet, by Mrs. D. B. Kahnweiler and Prof. E. D. Goodman; "It was a Dream," soprano solo, by Miss Rosa Macks; "Only Thee," piano solo—Galop de Concert—by Prof. E. D. Goodman; Soprano Solo, Mrs. D. B. Kahnweiler, and a piano solo by Master Isaac Greenwald. It is enough to say that the entire programme was artistically rendered and that the listeners were delighted at the musical skill displayed.

The Fair will open this evening at 7:30 o'clock; at 9 o'clock the raffling will commence; at 11 o'clock the polls will be closed, and the articles remaining on hand will be disposed of at auction. If the raffling should not be concluded at the hour appointed for closing the polls, it will be resumed after the counting of the votes, as it is the aim of the Committee to conclude all the business to-night.

The Fire at Wadesboro.

Later intelligence of the disastrous fire at Wadesboro, of which we gave a brief account in yesterday's Review, gives the probable loss as about \$20,000, upon which there is insurance to the amount of \$9,000. The losses are distributed as follows: William and Alexander Murr, tinware and groceries, \$2,500, upon which there was an insurance of \$800; G. P. Horton, groceries, \$2,500, insurance \$1,200; Dr. B. B. Horton, general merchandise, \$4,000; no insurance; W. N. Pinkston, groceries, \$800, no insurance; N. Mensing, baker, \$1,000 no insurance; T. S. Crowson, dry goods; \$3,900; covered by insurance; the Misses Lester, no insurance and loss not known; loss on building \$1,200; insurance \$800; A. G. Bruber, market, loss considerable \$200 of which is covered by insurance.

These are the estimates and the facts will probably not differ materially from these figures.
