The Proposed Clinton and Point Caswell Railroad.

Messrs. J. C. Heyer and Owen Fennell, Jr., have been appointed by the subscribers to the proposed narrow gauge railroad between Point Caswell, Pender county, and Clinton, Sampson county, to connect with Wilmington river steamers, a committee to solicit subscriptions in this city to aid the proposed enterprise. These gentlemen are peculiarly fitted for that duty, as they are both well acquainted with the country through which it is intended the road shall pass, the people and the products.

We understand that Messrs. Heyer and Fennell will at once proceed to the business assigned them, and as the enterprise, if completed, would be of immense benefit to this city, we hope they may meet with such success as will warrant the commencement of the undertaking.

The Board of Health.

The regular semi-annual meeting of the New Hanover County Board of Health was held recently in the County Commissioners' Room, present: Col. W. L. Smith, Mayor of the city; Mr. H. A. Baggs, Chairman of the Board of County Commissioners; Dr. J. C. Walker, Superintendent of Health, and Drs. E. A. Anderson, Thos. P. Wood, F. W. Potter, E. D. King and W. W. Lane.

Col. Smith was re-elected President of the Board for the ensuing term and Dr. J. C. Walker was re-elected Superintendent of Health.

The Board adjourned to meet again to-morrow (Thursday) evening, in the Commissioners' Room.

Bible Society Meeting.

Notwithstanding the inclemency of the weather, quite a large audience assembled at the Bible Society meeting, held last evening at the Front Street M. E. Church. The introductory services were conducted by Revs. C. M. Payne, of the Second Presbyterian Church, J. B. Taylor, of the First Baptist Church, and T. Page Ricard, of the Fifth Street M. E. Church. Rev. Calvin H. Wiley, Agent of the American Bible Society of North Carolina, made a short opening address, introducing Rev. Dr. Hunt, Secretary of the Bible Society of New York City. The latter gentleman made an exceedingly able and eloquent address, which was listened to with profound attention and interest. The meeting was closed with appropriate services, conducted by Revs. Messrs. North and Woods.

The Weather.

The Chief Signal Officer of the Army furnishes the following special bulletin to the press:

The storm which was central in the southwest yesterday morning, moved rapidly to the northeast, and is now central near Lake Ontario. Rain has prevailed in the Southern and Middle States and snow in the Upper Mississippi Valley, Lake Region, and New England. The following stations report more than one inch of rainfall during the past 24 hours: Cairo, Knoxville, Little Rock, Louisville, Nashville and Sandy Hook. The winds have shifted to northerly in the Northwest and Southwest, with colder fair weather; the temperature has risen slightly in the Middle States, Ohio Valley and Lake Region, and in the Gulf States and New England, but continues about ten degrees above the mean for the month in the districts east of the Rocky Mountains. The indications are that fair, cooler weather will prevail on the Atlantic Coast during Thursday, with no colder northerly winds.

The Fire Alarm Bell Tower.

Elvin Artz, colored, has been awarded the contract for building the tower for the fire alarm bell on the lot of the Howard Relief Fire Engine Co., No. 1, on Fourth, between Market and Dock streets, subject, however, to the approval of the Board of Audit and Finance. His bid was \$461, the others being \$470, \$473.50 and \$475. The plan for the tower, which is to be 49 feet 8 inches high, and 14 feet square at the base, was furnished by Mr. James F. Post, and is now on file at the City Hall. The tower is to be weather boarded and supplied with the necessary windows, and we presume the work will be soon begun.

Mayor Smith, Aldermen J. B. Huggins and James W. Telfair were the committee appointed to take charge of the matter.

What Was Done Then and There.

The 139th monthly (being the semi-annual Grand) Distribution of the Louisiana State Lottery took place on the 13th day of December as usual. \$100,000 the first capital prize, fell to ticket No. 94,982, which was sold in tenths of \$10,000 each, one of which was collected by J. Drouett, of the Firemen's Ins. Co., New Orleans; one by W. G. McConnell, Toledo St., near St. Charles St., New Orleans; one by Miss Mary J. Higgins, a nurse in J. L. Kidwell's family, Prospect and Frederick Sts., Washington, D. C.; two-tenths, or \$20,000, by A. Z. Ackerman, a farmer at Millford, Del.; the remaining tenths (or \$50,000) were held by parties who did not desire any publicity given to their names. The second prize of \$50,000 was drawn by No. 82,872. The third by No. 69,702. The fourth of \$10,000 each, by Nos. 70,132, one-half held by William Page, 2,022 Carson St., Pittsburg, Pa., and 92,388, drawn in tenths—two of which (\$2,000) were held by George P. Theard, No. 261 Royal St., New Orleans; one by P. T. Simpson, No. 61 Royal St., New Orleans; one by Capt. Thos. Wall, No. 36 Palmyra St., New Orleans; two-tenths by L. De Poorter, of Edgard P. O., St. John the Baptist Parish, La. The fifth capitals of \$5,000 each drawn by No. 27,490, wholly held by J. M. Walker, Danville, Va., and Nos. 43,290, 4,669, 90,267, sold in tenths, fell to Geo. A. Bright, Carmi, Ill.; Jno. M. Reux, No. 3,230 North N. St., Georgetown, D. C.; W. H. Portlock, through W. P. Campbell & Co., Bankers, Florence, Ala.; G. A. MacDonald, of New York City; Jas. Casey, also of New York City; F. Sites, No. 607 Girard ave., Phila., Pa.; Jno. H. Skidmore, No. 30 Cross St., (Charlestown), Boston, Mass.; besides many other thousands of dollars.
