The Gale To-Day.

The rain and sleet which commenced falling here yesterday evening and settled into steady rain this morning, has been quite general, extending from Pensacola, Fla., to Washington, D. C. The greatest velocity of wind has been at Hatteras (of course) where it blew, from Southeast, at the rate of 40 miles per hour. At Smithville it blew at the rate of 25 miles per hour and at 11 o'clock, this forenoon, it had the same velocity in this city for a short time. The gale was abating when this was being written. The storm has been general throughout the Southern portion of the country, but has been the heaviest at Charlotte, in this State, where the rainfall amounted to 82-100 of an inch. In this city it amounted to 60-100 of an inch. The storm is now nearly over in this section, and is evidently passing northward to wards the Lake Region.
