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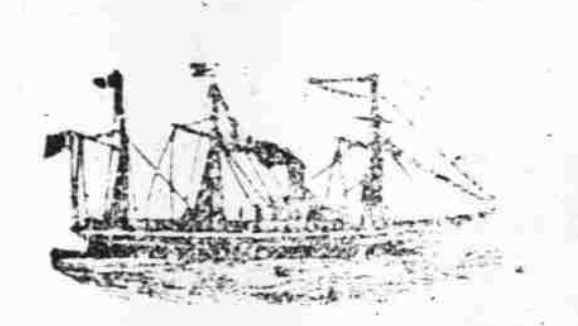

county, was in the city to-day and favor-
ed us with a brief visit.

Mr. W. N. Holt, formerly of this
city, but now of the firm of Peacock,
Hunt & Co., of Savannah, Ga., is here
to-day on a flying visit.

Capt. A. C. Ward, Sheriff of Pender
county, settled the taxes for his county
with the State Treasurer yesterday at
Raleigh, amounting to \$3,502 11.

As stated by us yesterday, Bishop
Lyman is expected to arrive here to-night
and to preach and ordain to the diaconate
at St. James Church to-morrow at
the morning services.

The British barquentine *Vick &
Mebane*, so well known in these waters,

The Opera House.

"Hamlet"—the master production of
Shakespeare's wonderful mind—was pre-
sented to an intensely interested audience
at the Opera House in this city, last
night, with Mr. Frank Mayo in the title
role. Owing to the lateness of the hour
when the company arrived in the city
and the necessary time required in pre-
paration, the curtain did not rise until
about 9 o'clock, causing considerable
impatience in the expectant audience.
But when the curtain rose upon the first
act, all impatience ceased, and in a very
few moments the entire audience were
completely absorbed in the play, following
the actors with the closest attention and
with unflagging interest until the curtain
dropped upon the last act, which did not
occur until shortly after midnight.

Of the performance, we may say that
we were agreeably disappointed. The
Hamlet of Mr. Mayo far exceeded our
expectations, and in many respects was
simply superb. There were a few un-
pleasant mannerisms in the open-
ing scene, but as the play pro-
gressed and he became warmed up to the
work, his whole being seemed embodied
in the character he impersonated. He
has a fine stage presence and a good
voice, although in some passages there
was an indistinctness in articulation
which might possibly be the result of a
cold, or possibly from some defect in the
acoustic properties of the house, as we
have noticed the same trouble before
with good elocutionists. His soliloquy
commencing with, "To be or not to be,"
was particularly fine and his advice to
the "players" was perfect. His support
was excellent throughout. Miss Laura
Chaney, as *Ophelia*, was superb and
won the hearts and sympathies of the
entire audience. The accusing scene be-
tween Hamlet and his mother, *Queen Ger-
trude*, (Jennie Jewell Hotchkiss) was a
wonderful piece of acting on the part of
both. The play was a success in its
entirety and we hope that a crowded
house, which they richly deserve, may
greet Mr. Mayo and his company to-
night.

Mutilated Coins
For the purpose of facilitating the
withdrawal of mutilated coin from cir-
culation, the superintendents of coinage
mints have been authorized by the Sec-
retary of the Treasury to purchase mutil-
ated United States silver coins of stand-
ard fineness in sums of \$3 and upwards
without melting or assay, paying at the
rate of \$1 per ounce of standard silver
contained. There is now not near as
much mutilated coin in circulation here
as a year ago.

hung on Friday, the 30th of June next,
which is a year, lacking two days, from
the date of the shooting of the Presi-
dent.

Murder Most Foul.

Yesterday's *Newbern News* brings to
us full particulars of the murder of Mr.
Jos. M. Agostini, an old and respected
citizen of that place, and the brother of
Mr. F. M. Agostini, Sr., in this city.
The murdered man was in the employ of
the Midland R. R., and his murderer is
one Henry Bryan, colored, who was also
employed by the Company. There was
no provocation. Bryan stuck Mr. Agos-
tini with a knife, severing the spinal
column, death resulting within twenty
minutes. The murderer is in jail.

From This Port.

The following exhibits of leading ar-
ticles of exports from this port for the
crop year up to January 31 is cetrinly
encouraging, showing, as it does, an in-
crease in every article except spirits and
crude turpentine:

Cotton—51,959 bales coastwise and
56,082 foreign, in 1882, against 33,215
coastwise and 62,513 foreign, in 1881, a
total increase of 12,313 bales.

Spirits—23,881 casks coastwise and
54,593 foreign, in 1882, against 27,534
coastwise and 56,960 foreign in 1881, a
decrease of 6,020 casks.

Rosin—32,554 barrels coastwise and
310,684 foreign, in 1882, against 46,984
coastwise and 268,640 foreign, in 1881,
an increase of 27,614 barrels.

Tar—28,234 barrels coastwise and 12-
747 foreign, in 1882, against 30,629
coastwise and 5,467 foreign, in 1881, an
increase of 4,885 barrels.

Crude—1,749 barrels coastwise and
102 foreign, in 1882, against 2,529 coast-
wise and none foreign, in 1881, a de-
crease of 678 barrels.

Lumber—4,149,488 feet coastwise and
899,397 foreign, in 1882, against 1,834-
898 coastwise and 2,225,893 foreign, in
1881, an increase of 988,094 feet.

The Gale.

The gale of wind with which we have
been visited to-day, commenced quite
early in the morning and increased in
violence, though fitfully, until 12.20
p. m., when it blew at the rate of
45 miles per hour. One of the first
freaks of the gale, which came from the
Southwest, was to break the steamer
Waccamaw, which was made fast to a
wharf on the opposite side of the river
from her moorings and float her across to
this side, bringing up at the Princess
street dock. There was no serious dam-
age done to the steamer, but as she had
her anchor down at the time, in coming
across the river it caught and parted
the cable of the Signal Service telegraph
line, thereby interrupting commu-
nication with Smithville, from whence
many are solicitous to hear. The
steam tugs *Modoc* and *Siam* also
parted their moorings and drifted to this
side of the river, but sustained no serious
damage. The schooner *Thomas R.
Pillsbury*, which was fast at Chadbourn's
wharf, parted her moorings and drifted
above the dry dock before she was
brought up and secured. The lighter
Washington also got adrift, but was
secured and made fast before any serious
damage resulted.
