**Exports Foreign.**  
Ger. barque Constantine von Rans ecke, Fretwurst, cleared at this port to-day for Liverpool, with 1,269 bales cotton, shipped by Messrs D. R. Murchison & Co., and Ger. barque Michael, Marx, cleared for Stettin, with 3,425 barrels rosin, shipped by Messrs E. Peschau & Westermann.  
**Judge Seymour Nominated.**

District Court for the Eastern District of North Carolina, to succeed the lamented Judge Brooks. It is thought that in all probability Judge Seymour will be confirmed.

**Magistrate's Court.**  
Warrock Perry, colored, was brought before Justice Millis this morning for examination, charged with an assault and battery with a deadly weapon—a hatchet—upon Joseph Baie, also colored. The defendant was found guilty of the charge and required to give a bond in the sum of \$50 for his appearance at the next term of the Criminal Court, in default of which he was committed.  
Joseph Baie, the plaintiff in the above case, was arraigned upon a charge of assault upon Warrock Perry, the defendant in the first case, and was found guilty and ordered to pay a fine of \$5 and costs. He paid up and was discharged.
