Education in Brunswick.
We were pleased to receive a call this morning from Mr. J. H. Mints, a member of the Board of Commissioners in Brunswick county, and Mr. Geo. Leonard, the Superintendent of Public Schools in that county. Mr. Mints tells us that the finances of Brunswick are in a healthy condition, and that there is a sufficiency of money in the treasury to run the public schools. He, as well as Mr. Leonard, regrets the apathy of the people of the county in regard to the educational facilities offered them.

From Mr. Leonard, we learn that there are about 2,800 school children in Brunswick county, of whom 1,500 are white and 1,300 colored. Only about one-fifth of these attend the schools. There are 51 school districts and 27 school houses, and 6 white and 7 colored teachers now engaged in teaching. The per capita is \$1.25. Mr. Leonard is now making the rounds of the schools, speaking wherever he goes, and visiting the people, and endeavoring to awaken an interest in the cause of education. He finds the schools generally in good condition, but bewails the apathy which prevails in so many sections. We can but trust that his earnest efforts for awakening an interest on the subject may be successful.

Charged with Intimidation.
Four parties from Sampson county, two by the name of Herring, one named Mathews, and one named Giles, were examined before U. S. Commissioner McQuigg this morning on the charge of having intimidated one Lewis J. Smith, a Greenbacker, during the late Presidential election. The warrant for their arrest was issued by T. B. Funnell, U. S. Commissioner at Raleigh. Commissioner McQuigg heard the case and discharged the parties, there being no evidence against them to convict.

Criminal Court.
The proceedings before this tribunal to-day were as follows:
John Statcher, for an assault with a deadly weapon was found not guilty.
William Lloyd, for larceny, was found guilty and sentenced to two years in the penitentiary.

During the present term of court the Grand Jury brought 24 true bills and 5 not true bills. They were discharged at noon to-day.

It is probable that all cases for the jury will be disposed of to-day, and that on Monday next the Court will hear motions and adjourn.
