The River.

Steamboatmen report that there is plenty of water for boating purposes in the Cape Fear, though there is a gradual falling off in the freshet.

They also report that nearly all the rafts with which the river has been recently filled have reached the city and there are but few now on the way.

The Passport.

Capt. Harper, of the steam yacht *Passport*, thinks that he will establish the summer schedule for his boat this year about the first of April. In two weeks from this time he expects to lay up and have a general repairing and refitting so as to fit the gallant little craft for her Summer duties. The upper deck will be covered over, just as it was last Summer.

Magistrate's Court.

The charge was sustained, and he was ordered to give bail for his appearance at the next term of the Criminal Court in the sum of \$100, failing to do which he was committed to jail.

The Anniversary Ball.

The Anniversary Ball, the 26th, given in Germania Hall last evening, by the members of Howard Relief Fire Engine Co., No. 1, was largely attended, and was greatly enjoyed by all who were so fortunate as to be present. It was voted the most successful of the many given by this gallant fire company. So great was the enjoyment, in fact, that the dancing was kept up until 6 o'clock this morning.

A Water Filter.

We find in the *Southern Farmers' Monthly* the following sensible suggestions: Serious sickness would often be averted from the household, if among other sanitary regulations, none but filtered water was drunk by its members. Water may look and taste like the purest, and still contain disease germs that we would retreat from in horror if they but presented themselves duly labelled. Wells, cisterns and springs that occupy ground lower than that of drains, vaults or barnyards, within a hundred feet or more, should be regarded with suspicion, no matter how "splendid" the water may appear.

A good and efficient filter can be made in this way: Take a cask, remove one end and set it upright, the open end at the top. At one-third of the distance from the bottom place a round partition, pierced with round holes. On this arrange a layer of clean, small pebbles, and over them a layer of charcoal and another of sand, topping it with more pebbles. Over this put another with holes in it, or a layer of good sized stones, to prevent the pebbles from being disturbed when water is poured in. A faucet is to be placed in the bottom to draw off the water. A pail of water and a lump of ice placed in the top of the cask and closely covered, supplies the perfection of drinking water for twenty-four hours.

Another Excursion Boat.

We understand that Capt. Bisbee, of the steamer *Elizabeth*, has purchased a new boat in Boston, which he intends to run between here and Smithville. She is said to be of suitable size for an excursion boat, and is expected here in a few days.

To See or Not To Be.

What, with the Wilmington and Onslow railroad, the railroad to the Sound, the Burgaw & Onslow railroad, the Duplin & Onslow railroad, the Clinton & Faison railroad, the Warsaw & Clinton railroad, the Clinton & Point Caswell railroad, the Angola Tramway, a line of steamers to Herringville, in Sampson county, new steamers for Smithville, and the Duplin Canal, together with the routes of travel by land and water already established, it would seem that our citizens might be able to go about where they please and that all residents in the country who would visit the city on business or for pleasure might find means of conveyance without much difficulty. We hope, for the benefit of all concerned, that all these projects may be speedily executed, and, in fact, wish that they were already completed.

Taking Time by the Forelock.

At the November elections to be held in this State, says the *News and Observer*, there will be five ballot boxes at each voting place and the tickets will be placed in each box in this wise:

1. Members of Congress, to be voted for in each Congressional district. (Should it be decided by Congress that the member gained by this State is to be voted for by the State at large, the name of this additional number will head the Congressional ticket in each district.)
2. An Associate Justice of the Supreme Court; four Judges of the Superior Court for the 1st, 2d, 3d and 6th judicial districts, and solicitors for all the judicial districts. Each district votes for its own solicitor, but his name goes on the judicial ticket.
3. Members of the General Assembly.
4. Clerk Superior Court, County Treasurer, in counties having the office; Register of Deeds, Surveyor, Coroner and Sheriff.
5. Township constable.
