Wilmington Library Association.
The members and officers of the above named association met at their Library rooms last evening, and were called to order by the President, Alex. Sprunt, Esq. He then gave a brief review of the history of the organization, and was followed with brief addresses from Messrs Wm. L. Smith and Charles H. Robinson. On motion of Col. Wm. L. Smith, the following named gentlemen were appointed, with the President as Chairman ex-officio, to solicit members to a Literary Society to be organized among the members of the Association, viz: Messrs C. H. Robinson, Herbert Smith Iredell Meares and Walter Rutland. This committee was instructed to draft a constitution and by-laws, to be submitted at a general meeting, which will take place on Friday evening next. All persons connecting themselves with this society at that meeting are to be allowed the privileges of the Library Association free of the initiation fee. It is a worthy, a necessary enterprise, for the advantage, instruction and improvement, mutually and socially, of our citizens, and we hope that the efforts being made will meet with a rousing response.

The Weather.
The Chief Signal Officer of the Army furnishes the following special bulletin to the press:
The barometer is highest in the Middle States and lowest in Dakota and Minnesota. A storm centre is developing in the West and Gulf States, where general rains have fallen; in the other districts fair weather has prevailed; Southern winds are reported west of the Mississippi river and in the Upper Lake regions, and Northeastly on Atlantic Coast stations. The temperature has risen decidedly in the Northwest, rising 30 degrees at Lee Crose and 23 degrees at St. Paul. The temperature is below the mean for the month in the Atlantic States.
A warm wave, extending to the Southeast, averaging 20 degrees above the mean for the month, is central in Manitoba and Minnesota. The following temperatures were reported yesterday afternoon: Norfolk, 38; Charleston, 49; Savannah, 52; Jacksonville and New Orleans, 60; Galveston, 62; San Antonio, 56. The Mississippi river has risen 6 inches at Cairo, where it is 10 feet 7 inches above the danger line. It is above inches above the danger line. It is above the danger line at Memphis and Vicksburg, but stationary. The Ohio has fallen 48 inches at Pittsburg, 14 inches at Cincinnati and 54 inches at Sandusky. Fair weather is indicated for Sunday in New England, and cloudy weather and rain in the East Gulf States, Tennessee, Ohio Valley and South Atlantic States.

Marine Disaster
From Mr. Haney, of the Signal Office in this city, we get the following information relative to the loss of the schr. *Pearl Nelson*, which cleared at this port on the 18 inst., for Plymouth, Mass., by Messrs Robinson & King, with 1,250 barrels tar. "The Signal Corps Station at Life Saving Station No. 6 reports to the Chief Signal Office as follows: Schr. *Pearl Nelson*, of Massachusetts, Murdock Kemp, master, from Wilmington, N. C., bound to Plymouth, Mass., with a crew of six men and a cargo of twelve hundred barrels of tar, came ashore abreast of Life Saving Station No. 5, Virginia, at 4 A. M. to day (February 24th) owing to miscalculation, in a heavy north wind and heavy sea. The crew have all been saved. The captain will not come ashore. A wrecking company has been notified. The vessel lies in 7 feet of water, but does not leak. A heavy north wind is blowing and there is a heavy sea."
