The Meeting at the Library.
The meeting of the young men called for the Library Room last evening, for the purpose of forming a literary society auxiliary to the Wilmington Library Association, was very largely attended both by the young men and by their elders.

The meeting was called to order by Mr. Alex. Sprunt, President of the Library Association. Mr. W. B. McKay was nominated and unanimously elected Chairman. He stated the object of the meeting to be to organize a young men's literary society, to be known as the "Literary Club of the Library Association," and called upon Mr. G. H. Smith, chairman of the committee on Rules for the Government of the Society, for his report. Mr. Smith, as his report, submitted a Constitution and By-Laws, which were adopted with a slight addition.

An election of officers was held, resulting in the selection of the following:

Vice President—G. Herbert Smith.
Secretary and Treasurer—M. S. Willard.

Forty-three members were enrolled and great interest was manifested by all who were present.

Short addresses of encouragement and advice were delivered by Col. W. L. Smith, Mr. R. A. Meares and Capt. John L. Wooster.
The Club will meet on the second and fourth Tuesday night of each month, the exercises to consist of debates, declamations, and essays.

The interest manifested in the meeting last night was very gratifying and we trust that it is indicative of a revival of literary interest among the young men of our city. The constitution, which was drawn by Mr. Herbert Smith, is an excellent one and we trust to see the club grow rapidly in numbers and influence.

Hazel Kirke.

Those of our readers who may attend the representation at the Opera House next Tuesday evening may promise themselves a pleasing treat in store for them. It is said to be a very fine piece, and it must be, as it has had a marvelous run.

Hazel Kirke is the daughter of a well-to-do miller, and has nursed back to life Lord Travers, whom her father saved from drowning. She is betrothed to Aaron Rodney, a wealthy neighbor, who nobly resigns her when he discovers the love which has grown up between her and Lord Travers. She marries the noble man, and her father, whose irascible temper prevents him from understanding the situation, drives her from home. She is happy with her husband until his mother tells her that she is not his lawful wife, and that he must marry another woman, whose fortune his dead father had stolen. This, she says, is the only course to save the family honor, and Hazel, believing that her husband has deceived her, flies from the place. Her father has lost his eyesight during her absence, and as she opens the window of the old room on a wild and stormy night, she hears him bewailing his misfortunes and charging them to her. She enters and meets Rodney, her old lover, who again offers to marry her. The old man does not know of her presence, and when Rodney asks his consent, he refuses, and says he would drive her from his door. After Rodney leaves, she resolves to drown herself, and leaves the house. A moment later a shout that Hazel is drowning is heard, and the old man in his helplessness can do nothing for her. The stubbornness and cruelty that drove her to the attempt to take her own life flashes upon him. In an instant, and in his misery, his senses leave him. Hazel is saved by Lord Travers, her husband, who has followed her. Her voice brings the old man back to the world again, and the play ends happily.

Annual Mortality.
According to the official reports of Dr. J. C. Walker, Superintendent of Health, as submitted to the Board of Aldermen, there was a total of 376 deaths in this city during the year 1881. Of these 104 were white and 272 colored.—There were 61 white adults and 43 white children, 53 males and 51 females; 133 colored adults and 139 children, 131 males and 141 females. This is within a fraction of 21 to the thousand or but little more than 2 per cent of the population. This is certainly a fine showing.

Magistrate's Court.
John McGowan was brought before Justice Gardner this morning charged with mismarking a hog, the property of Kliza Bryant, colored, and also one belonging to William Bradley. The charge was sustained and he was bound over in the sum of \$50 in each case for his appearance at the next term of the Criminal Court. Failing to give the required bonds he was committed to jail.
Kliza Bryant, colored, was the next case on the docket, she being charged with the larceny of two pigs. The defendant was discharged and the case dismissed.

City Court.
Aaron Jones, colored, brought before the Mayor this morning, charged with disorderly conduct; was found guilty and fined \$5 or ten days in the city prison. Not having the funds he was sent below.
Frances Moore, a colored woman, for disorderly conduct, was fined \$5 or city prison for ten days; she went below.
William Highman, a sailor, for disorderly conduct; was permitted to pay to the city treasurer \$5 or go below for ten days. He paid the money.
The case of W. H. Loftin, for receiving stolen goods, mention of which was made yesterday, was turned over to one of the magistrates for a hearing, and was postponed until Saturday next. In the meantime the prisoner languishes in the county jail.
