Annual Mortality.

According to the official reports of Dr. J. C. Walker, Superintendent of Health, as submitted to the Board of Aldermen, there was a total of 376 deaths in this city during the year 1881. Of these mitted a Constitution and By Laws- 104 were white and 272 colored .children, 53 males and 51 females; 133 colored adults and 139 children, 131 males and 141 females. This is within a fraction of 21 to the thousand or but little more than 2 per cent of the population. This is certainly a fine showing.
