Duplin Canal Company.

A meeting of the stockholders of the Duplin Canal Company was held at Magnolia, N. C., on March 10th, 1882. W. T. Bannerman, Esq., was placed in the Chair, and Mr. David Farrior was made Secretary.

The stock present and represented was verified, and it was ascertained that a quorum was present. The meeting was then declared fully organized.

Messrs. Wm. Larkins, R. H. McKoy, Wm. Calder, G. W. Williams, W. T. Bannerman, David Brock and W. L. Young were elected a Board of Directors for the ensuing year.

The following resolutions, introduced by Mr. S. O. Register, were unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Directors of the Duplin Canal Company be and are hereby required to conduct the affairs of this Company strictly upon the cash system; and to that end no debts shall be contracted, unless there is money on hand to pay the same.

Resolved further, That the Directors of the Company are prohibited from mortgaging the canal, its bed or superstructure, its rights, franchises and privileges, unless authorized by the stockholders themselves in meeting assembled.

Resolved, That for the purpose of obviating the necessity of raising money upon a mortgage, that the present stock paid in and such other stock as may be subscribed and paid in shall be and is hereby declared preferred stock, and shall be prior to first mortgage. Provided, however, that a sufficient amount of said stock shall be paid in to construct the canal to the Northeast river at Burton's old field before the same shall be so preferred.

Resolved, That the Board of Education be requested to pay per acre or in some other form for the lands that have been already drained by the Company, and for such other lands as may be drained hereafter, lying on Angola Bay, be longing to the school fund.

Resolved, That the county of Duplin and the town of Wilmington each be requested to give aid to the company, either by loan or by taking stock, as is provided for in the charter of the company by the General Assembly of North Carolina.

The following was presented:
MAGNOLIA, N. C., March 10, 1882.
To the Stockholders of the Duplin Canal Company:
GENTLEMEN:—I respectfully ask, in behalf of the Angola Tramway Company, the right of way across the Canal. We, the Tramway Company, will construct our own bridge.

The above petition was considered and was granted unanimously.

The following was read and unanimously adopted:
Resolved, That after 10 days notice shall be given to the delinquent subscribers any legal or other expenses that may accrue to the company in making collections shall be charged to the delinquent stockholder, and the amount deducted from the stockholder's dividend whenever the company may declare a dividend.

On motion of Mr. W. T. Bannerman, resolutions of thanks were voted to Mr. and Mrs. Hamlin for having voluntarily furnished the Hall for the use of the stockholders and otherwise extended many courtesies.

On motion of Mr. David Brock the next annual meeting of the stockholders was fixed for Saturday, March 10th, 1883, at such place as may be designated by the President.
