In view of the rivalry among the Republican bosses, the Northern Ohio Journal thinks that "never in the history of the Democratic party has it been as important for untested and wise action as now, and by the pursuance of each patriotic and unselfish course the Democratic party will gain complete control of the government, and the people will be rid of the most powerful and corrupt organization that ever controlled the affairs of a government."

The Tammany and Irving Hall men have agreed on a joint celebration of Andrew Jackson's birthday on the 16th day of March, but have not as yet agreed on a place of meeting. The Irving Hall people being opposed to using the Tammany Hall building. Mr. John Kelly is opposed to inviting Mr. Tilden to be one of the speakers, and declares that he will "never consent to sit under the same roof with that man."

A New York letter of Wednesday, referring to the advance in cotton, says:—"The principal stocks are at New York and New Orleans, and strong holders of these will not sell. The Continent is buying in the interior. Considerable short interest exists, but it refuses to cover, on the ground that the general business of the country is not good, and that stocks of the staple articles are in excess of the demand."

We see from the Boston Advertiser that Sweet & Co. profess their ability to pay dollar for dollar, and will perhaps resume. There are no rumors afloat affecting any other bank or banker. Mr. Sweet has been ill and mentally incapacitated for some time, and the next partner in charge was also sick and absent. At the time of the collapse the house was in charge of juniors of no experience, who simply lost their heads. The liabilities are between \$2,000,000 and \$3,000,000.

A case of considerable interest is now before the Supreme Court of the United States from the State of Virginia. It seems that Wm. P. Parish, of Virginia, purchased a number of slaves from George Rives, of the same State, in 1863, paying him a portion of the purchase money and giving bond for the residue. The defendant now claims that it was a Confederate contract, if a contract at all; and further, that under Lincoln's emancipation the negroes were free at the time of their sale. The case is an interesting one, and is attracting considerable attention.

HOW IT WORKS.

In the flourishing town of Oxford, in Granville county, as we learn from the Free Lance, there is a young colored man who has been the cause of considerable commotion and not a little indignation among the people of his own race and color. The young man in question is not yet a voter, but his father is, and the latter is a Democrat. This is an unpardonable sin among the colored people, the punishment of which may, ought and does extend to the third and fourth generation. The cause of the present trouble is that the young man, who has been acceptably engaged in school teaching, and has passed creditable examinations before the school committee of Oxford, had written a communication, which was published in the columns of the Free Lance, in which he speaks in terms of commendation of the Superintendent of Public Instruction, Mr. Scarborough.

This aroused the ire of the white and colored Republicans of Oxford, and the latter, encouraged by the former, waited upon the town school committee and insisted that the school, to which the young man had been assigned, should be taken from him. This demand, which was emphasized with the statement that the young man was a Democrat, as may well

be presumed, was peremptorily refused, and the delegation were informed that politics had nothing to do with the requirements of a public school teacher in the town of Oxford, and that as the teacher in question was competent and efficient, he would be retained as teacher of the school, and that they could send their children to him or not, just as they pleased.

From all the information we can gather, it appears that this young man is possessed of intelligence and an enterprise and ambition beyond the average of his race, and with some desire for literary pursuits, he wrote a very creditable article relative to the Superintendent of Public Instruction, without any reference, whatever, to political matters, or without giving the article any political bias or significance. It was simply his endorsement of Mr. Scarborough as the head of the educational interests of the State. But Mr. Scarborough is a Democrat, and the young man's father is a colored Democrat. This is the head and front of his offending, and this is a terrible crime in the eyes of the colored Republicans. It requires an immense amount of true courage in a colored man to be a Democrat, and he must expect to be bullied and boycotted until his life is made miserable if he dares to vote the Democratic ticket or endorse Democratic sentiments.

Who Represent the People. According to the directory of the forty-seventh congress, there are in the body 293 members:

There are seventy-six members, whose professions are as follows: Fifty-seven lawyers. Five bank officers. Three railroad officials. Three professional politicians. Of the useful professions there are eleven. Three merchants. Three manufacturers. Two miners. One general business. One farmer. One editor.

Vital Statistics. It has been calculated by a recent writer that of 10 children born in Norway a little over seven reach their twentieth year; that in England and in the United States of America somewhat less than seven reach that stage; that in France only five reach it, and in Ireland less than five.
