The Fire Yesterday.

We could not give very full particu
lars yesterday in regard to the fire of
that afternoon, because of the late hour
at which it occurred. The flames caught
from a spark evidently, but whether the
spark was from the chimney of the house
or from some other chimney is as yet
uncertain. The roofing was of shingles,
old and decayed, and it burst very
rapidly under the encouragement of the
high wind which was prevailing at the
time. There was some hitch, appar
ently, in the fire department, and a con
sequent delay, as it seemed in getting
water on the house, but finally a section
of hose was attached to the hydrant at
the corner of the street, not more than
fifty feet from the burning building, but
for some minutes the stream was so weak
that the water could not be thrown fairly
to the top of the house, a distance of
not more than fifty feet. This was soon
remedied, however, by an increase of
pressure, and the fire steams, having
gotten to work also by this time a fierce
fight with the wind and the fire soon
resulted in a victory for the gallant
firemen. The house was a three story
and a "jump" building, and was built
nearly forty years ago. The first and
second stories remain almost intact, the
flames having been confined to the upper
floor and the garret. The damages on
the building will hardly exceed \$300.
There was considerable loss on the furni
ture and wearing apparel, some of which
was burned and some destroyed by fire
on the third floor, while the contents of
the second were all removed, some of
it in a damaged condition, but none
very seriously injured. The entire loss
on the building, furniture, damage to
stock, &c., is probably about \$1,200, on
which, unfortunately, there was no in
surance.

Postoffice Robbery at Goldsboro.

On Friday last we published a brief
item of news relative to the robbery
of the postoffice at Goldsboro
by a young colored man by the name of
Hatcher, employed there, and his dete
ction and capture. We gather the fol
lowing particulars from the *Goldsboro
Messenger*:

For some weeks it has been evident to
the postmaster here, Mr. John B. Smith,
that some one was robbing the office, but
he never for a moment supposed that the
robbery was the work of any of his em
ployees. All efforts to find out the guilty
parties failed until Thursday night last,
when James Hatcher, a young colored man
was caught in the act, as he was going
through and robbing the mails brought
to the office that night.

James had been trusted to sleep in a
little room connected with the postoffice.
Thursday night he attended to the mails
and, it seems, was amusing himself in his
bed room by pilfering the contents of the
mail bag, when the sudden alarm of fire
caused him to forget his robbery, and
leaving his ill-gotten booty on his bed,
he hastened to the fire. During his ab
sence from the office the evidence of his
rogueries were discovered by Mr. Smith,
who with Maj. Grant and Sheriff Grant
ham, then upon duty, took steps to catch him.

When Jim re-entered the office he se
curely fastened the several doors leading
to it and soon resumed his work of pilfer
ing. Messrs. Smith and Grant had in
the meantime concluded themselves where
they could watch him while Sheriff
Gratham had taken position at the door
to prevent Hatcher's escape. When he
was told to open the door he hesitated
but finally complied and the following
evidence of his robbery were found in
his possession—a roll of chronos ad
dressed to Mrs. L. M. Briley at Willow
Green; one empty box addressed to K. V.
J. G. Fry, at Raleigh; one box of cuffs
and collars addressed to E. M. Moore,
Kings Mountain High School; one box,
with address destroyed, destination of
which was Mocksville; a gold locket and
chain; a fine ivory handle pistol, and a
roll of chronos. Other evidences, such
as empty boxes and packages of stamped
envelopes, were found at his home, leav
ing no doubt that Jim had persistently
robbed the mails. He was arrested

enough to appropriate mostly packages
addressed to parties at a distance and
merely passing through the office, yet it
is generally believed that he has also in
tercepted many letters and packages
mailed here or addressed to parties here,
which have failed to come to hand.

On Friday Jim was arraigned before
U. S. Commissioner D. Cogdell, but at
his request the preliminary examination
was deferred until 10 o'clock to-day.

Hatcher has only been in the office a
few months. His appointment was a
concession made to the clamor on the
part of the colored people here to have
Mr. Smith removed because he would
not employ a colored clerk in the office.

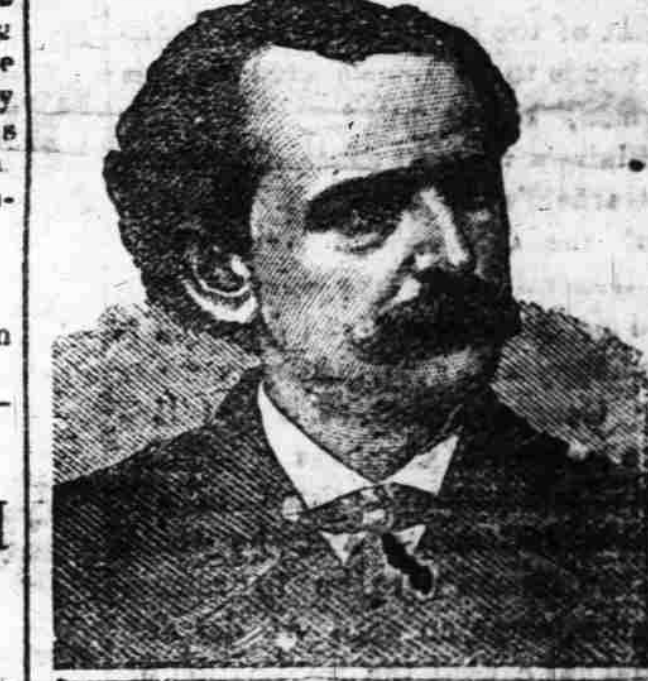
