Old Hickory.
To-day is the 115th anniversary of
the birth of Andrew Jackson, the patriot,
statesman and heroic warrior. Among
the many illustrious names that adorn
the pages of American history none
stand out with more prominence than
that of Andrew Jackson. His blood
was shed in his youth, during the Revo-
lutionary war, and by his noble daring
and generalship at the battle of New
Orleans, the country was saved from
foreign invasion. As evidences of the
confidence felt in him as a statesman and
jurist, he was once a member of
Congress, and twice called to the
Senate chamber; was appointed
Governor of Florida; was once a mem-
ber of the Supreme Court Bench of
Tennessee, and was twice elected Pres-
ident of the United States. It was dur-
ing the last term of his Presidency that
the crowning act of patriotism was con-
summated by his veto of that rotten and
corrupt institution, the so-called U. S.
Bank. There has been no observance
of the day here.

Thomas' Church, where an address will
be delivered by Rev. Claidian Northrop,

The River.

Steamboatmen inform us that the river
was falling rapidly yesterday at the
time they left Fayetteville, and that
unless there are rains on the upper Cape
Fear within a short time to check the

and delays will ensue. There are now
about 4 feet of water on the Shoals,
which, at the rate it was falling yester-
day, will soon be in such condition that
loaded boats will not be able to pass.

New Postal Ratings.

The Post office Department has ruled
that the designation of the business or
vocation of the party addressed on the
address side of a postal card renders the
card unmailable, when the place of busi-
ness is indicated in the direction.

The following rulings of the Depart-
ment in the January "Guide," this year,
should be carefully considered by pub-
lishers, news agents, merchants, and all
others who send packages to the post
office for transmission in the mail:

All sealed packages, except packages
of seed in sealed transparent envelopes
and packages sealed with internal reve-
nue stamps; all packages sewed up, ex-
cept in the case of seeds, where the ab-
sence of any other matter shall be ascer-
tained by feeling; and all packages in
any way so closed against inspection that
their contents cannot be fully ascertained
without breaking the seal, or without
undue delay in opening the same, are
subject to first-class postage—viz., three
cents for each half ounce or fraction
thereof.

The intent of the law is that packages
of third and fourth-class matter should
be so wrapped as to admit of their wrap-
pers being removed, or the packages
opened, so that postmasters may discov-
er whether any letter or writing not per-
mitted by law is enclosed therein. If
such examination cannot be made, the
packages are subject to letter-postage,
notwithstanding the fact that they may
be open at the ends.

Coastwise Commere.

Within the last six days there have
been four New York steamers in this
port, aggregating nearly or quite 4,000
tons carrying capacity. The *Benfactor*
left here on Saturday; the *Santo Do-
mingo* arrived on Sunday and left yester-
day; the *Regulator* arrived Tuesday
morning and is now at her wharf, and
the *Gulf Stream* arrived this morning
and is made fast to the wharf on the
opposite side of the river, waiting for a
place to be made vacant for her to come
across to her wharf and discharge her
cargo.

There are immense quantities of mer-
chandise crowding the warehouses of the
Company in this city to their utmost
capacity, some of which has arrived
from New York and has not been taken
away, while the remainder is stored
awaiting shipment, and the appearances
indicate that there is to be no abate-
ment in the amount at an early day. As fast
as shipments are made, other merchandise
is brought to make the place good. It
is a business and a more than busy place.

The Railroad Meeting.

A much larger number of persons than
we expected assembled at the Court
House last night in response to the call
for a meeting to consider the plan of the
proposed Clinton & Point Caswell Rail-
road. The meeting was called to order
by Mr. H. A. Bagg, and was organized
by calling Col. Roger Moore to the chair
and Mr. W. B. McKoy to act as Secre-
tary. Col. Moore, in a few pertinent
remarks, explained the object of the
meeting, and called upon Mr. E. W.
Kerr, of Sampson, to explain to the
audience the possibility and desirability
of the proposed route, together with its
present prospects, &c. The speech of
Mr. Kerr was interesting, forcible and
to the point. He showed the condition
of things as they now exist, and pictured
the future as it should exist were the
enterprise completed, and presented facts
which the business men and capitalists of
Wilmington are bound to take into se-
rious consideration. He was followed by
Mr. D. M. O'Hanlon, a practical civil
engineer, who made a statement as to
the probable cost of the road completed
and equipped, together with an estimate
of the yearly running expenses and the
probable income from passengers and
freights. If his figures approximate
correctness the road and its equipments
all ready for service will cost in the
neighborhood of \$175,000.

Mayor Smith and Messrs H. A. Bagg
and J. O. Stevenson were called upon
and they made short but earnest speeches
in which they endorsed the preceding
speakers.

A committee, consisting of Mayor
Smith and Messrs H. A. Bagg and J. C.
Stevenson, was appointed to co operate
with the committee appointed at Chnton,
to solicit subscriptions, and the several
committees were directed to report pro-
gress at a meeting which is to be held
at Point Caswell, at some future date
which is not yet selected.

A joint meeting of the Commercial
Exchange and the Produce Exchange,
with other citizens, in the interest of the
Clinton and Point Caswell R. R., was
held at the Exchange this afternoon, but
as it was nearly 5 o'clock when the meet-
ing was organized, the proceedings are
too late for this issue.
