Another Evidence of Decline.

Messrs Norwood Giles & Co., proprie-
tors of the Carolina Rice Mills in this
city, have contracted for the erection of
a large brick warehouse on their prem-
ises, on Chestnut street, between Water
and Front. It will be 43x60 feet and
four stories high, with a cupola on top,
and will be divided into bins for the
storage of rice, with a capacity of 60,-
000 bushels. There will be an eleva-
tor for raising and lowering the grain
and an arrangement whereby the rice
will be weighed on the upper floor while
the weight will be recorded on the first
floor. The contract for the work has
been made with Mr. James F. Post, and
ground was broken yesterday. The
foundation of the new building will be
laid at once and the building will be
fully completed and equipped for the
Fall business, say about the first of Au-
gust. The attention of those interested
is invited to this additional evidence of
the "decline of Wilmington."

The Barque August.

The German barque August, the mis-
fortune to which we mentioned yester-
day, is yet fast to the wharf at the foot
of Orange street, with her hold full, and
her decks nearly full of water, which
was poured into her yesterday afternoon.
She is fast with her head up stream, and
her keel on the bottom, and has consid-
erable of a list to port. To prevent her
getting a further list as the tide recedes,
which might result in being thrown upon
her beam ends, preventive stays have
been made fast in each top and carried
to the shore and hauled taut. Should
these stays be parted by the strain which
will necessarily come upon them during
the ebb tide, (and we think there is dan-
ger of it), the barque would be bound
to go over. When we visited her this
afternoon, the crew were engaged in bat-
tening down the hatches, which was no
easy job, as they were under water.
After this is accomplished, the services
of the fire engines will be called into
requisition to pump out the hold, which
will not take long, as the cargo is so
closely packed there is not much room
for water or anything else. After she
has been pumped out the hatches will
again be taken off and the cargo will be
discharged.

tenor voice, which he manages well, and
he has besides a clearness of enunciation
rarely met with in opera singers. The
chorus, although not large, was very
good, and the stage business admirably
devised. The performance was very
good throughout, and many of the mem-
bers of the opera were deservedly en-
cored.
