New Rice Mills.
Messrs. Norwood Giles & Co., of the Carolina Rice Mills, in this city, have determined to establish a branch of their business in Washington, in this State. With this object in view, they will build a large rice mill in Washington, and will equip it with all necessary appliances for doing good work. The mills will probably be as large as the Carolina Rice Mills in this city. It is expected that they will be ready for work by the Fall, probably by September 1st, and the erection of them is to be begun at once. Mr. Norwood Giles, the Senior member of the firm, will go to Washington and remain there some time for the purpose of taking charge of the mills, as soon as they are ready to receive the rice.
Washington is in the midst of a fine rice country, and the establishment there of these new mills will doubtless stimulate the production of this cereal. Rice enough will be found to run the mills both at Washington and Wilmington, to their fullest capacities, unless there should be some serious disaster to the crops this coming Summer.

Destructive Fire in Pender.
We learn that a fire broke out on the plantation of Dr. John R. Hawes and his son, Mr. Eddie Hawes, near Point Caswell, in Pender county, on the 22d inst., caused by the carelessness of some of the tenants, which, before it could be gotten under control, on the evening of the 23d inst., burned over an area of territory from fear to five miles in extent. There was a strong breeze blowing at the time the fire commenced, and the woods being very dry, the flames spread with fearful rapidity, defying for many hours all efforts to get them under control. Miles of tending were destroyed, and thousands of turpentine trees were rendered comparatively worthless, and really so for naval store purposes. The principal sufferers, aside from the two already named, are Mrs. Joel L. Moore and Messrs. John H. Murphy, David Ellison, Eli Larkins and the tenants living upon those estates. The loss is severe, amounting in the aggregate to many thousands of dollars. The fields are now entirely unprotected by fences, and farming operations for the season will be much delayed and circumscribed in consequence. Fortunately, no buildings were burned, although they were in great jeopardy during the prevalence of the fire.

Iron Works for Wilmington.
A number of capitalists from the North, accompanied by Gen. R. F. Hoke, arrived here this morning in private cars from Raleigh. The party is composed of Hon. Geo. Richards, of Dover, N. J., Judge A. Pardee, Maj. Cowley and Capt. Wise, of Philadelphia; Col. H. D. Van Nostrand, of New York, and Gen. R. F. Hoke, of Raleigh. They are all registered at the Parcell House, where they dined to-day. This afternoon they went up to the Navassa Company's Works, at Meares' Bluff. They have been visiting the iron mines at Chapel Hill, and their visit to Wilmington is, we understand, connected with this fact. In other words, we will state here briefly a fact of which we have long been aware, but which has not yet heretofore been mentioned in print, that extensive iron mills are to be established here. The matter has long been pending, and we are satisfied that the visit of these gentlemen here is connected with this matter, although we have no positive information as to this. We think, too, that it has some reference to the scheme Gen. Imboden's company has had in view, the construction of a road through from the Cranberry Iron Mines, in the mountains of this State, to this port.
Easter Day.
A correspondent of the *London Standard* expresses a decided opinion that Easter Day this year will fall on the anniversary of the actual date—April 9th, A. D. 30. He says:
"The old idea that our Lord's passion and resurrection occurred in A. D. 33 (given in most Bibles which have margins) was founded on the traditional belief—doubtless itself true—that He was about 33 years on earth, combined with the idea that the date of His nativity was four years later than it really was, the actual date of that event being, in all probability, B. C. 4. The only real doubt about the date of the resurrection is whether it was A. D. 29 or 30.
"Now, astronomy tells us that the full moon, which would be Paschal in the former years, fell on a Saturday (April 16th) which would be inconsistent with the circumstances narrated. But in A. D. 30 that full moon was on Thursday, April 6th, on which day the Passover meal was eaten, and our Lord suffered the next day (in our reckoning the same as in the Jewish), on which other observations connected with the Passover were still to be kept. This, then, I have very little doubt, was the true year; and if so, of course, the first Easter was on April 9th, on which day we shall this year celebrate its anniversary."
A private letter just received from England, referring to this subject, informs us that great excitement prevails among many of the religiously disposed people in that country, and prophetic warnings emanate from all quarters, pointing to some supernatural event which is expected about the time of this great Ecclesiastical festival. Some are looking for the end of this dispensation—others for the beginning of the too tardy millennium—all for some great and radical change.
