The Barque August.
The slow process of discharging this vessel is still going on with considerable disadvantage to the laborers, on account of the volume of smoke which yet remains. In consequence of this, much of the cotton in the after part of the vessel's hold, where the fire seems to have been the most severe, remains untouched, and it is not yet ascertained whether the barque is materially damaged in her timbers and planking by the fire or not. The stevedores will work into the after hold just as fast as the condition of the smoke will permit and as all the hatches are constantly kept open, it is hoped that work in this direction will not be much longer delayed.

Besides these there is a poem by Mrs. Sallie Neil Roach upon the "Charge of the Kentuckians at Stone River," and "Notes and Queries" regarding the wounding of Stonewall Jackson, making the number, as we have stated above, one of much interest to those who shared in the dangers of those times, or who revere the memories of those who fought and fell in the unequal contest.
