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IN CONGRESS YESTERDAY.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, March 24.—The Senate spent a large portion of the morning hour upon the Life Saving Service bill. The Florida Senators insisted upon a provision for stations at points on the Atlantic coast of Florida, as follows: Key West, Jupiter Inlet, Cape Canaveral and St. Augustine, and on the Gulf coast west of Apalachicola river; five in all.

Mr. Conger, in charge of the bill, argued that this was unnecessary, and Mr. Jones replied that the record showed 104 wrecks on the coast line just indicated.

The proposition was agreed to—yeas 36, nays 17. An amendment was adopted limiting the pay of surmen to \$50 per month.

The bill then passed—yeas 46, nays 8. The Chinese bill was received from the House and signed by the President pro tem. The bill having previously received the signature of the Speaker of the House, now goes to the President.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. Mr. Robinson called attention to the rule which provides that the committee shall report back the resolution calling upon the State Department for all information, within eight days, and to the fact that the resolution referred to the committee on Foreign Affairs, relative to the imprisonment of American citizens in Great Britain, had not, as yet been acted upon.

Mr. Williams, of Wis., chairman of the committee on Foreign Affairs, said he felt authorized to state that communication was being constantly had with the Government of Great Britain by the State Department, and it was understood that in a few days the committee would be able to make an intelligent report on the resolution.

The House then proceeded to the consideration of private business. Mr. Thomas, of Ky., from the committee on Mississippi Levees, reported a bill appropriating \$6,863,000, to be expended according to the plans of the Mississippi River Commission, for the improvement of the navigation and commerce of the Mississippi river. Referred to committee of the whole.

Oaths in Parliament. LONDON, March 23, 1882.—In the House of Lords today the Earl of Redesdale's bill providing that every peer and member of the House of Commons, before taking his seat, shall make a solemn and sincere declaration of affirmation of his belief in Almighty God, was opposed by the Earl of Shaftesbury, who moved the previous question. The motion was agreed to.

Hebrews and the czar. LONDON, March 23.—The Jewish World has received a telegram from St. Petersburg stating that the czar has refused to confirm the recommendations of the Commission on the Jewish Question in favor of compelling the Jews to quit the rural districts, on the ground that such expulsion would almost ruin agriculture, and that the recommendations are generally conceived in a vindictive spirit. The Herald, of St. Petersburg, says that General Ignatieff has ordered all the Jewish chemists of St. Petersburg to sell their business. At a meeting of the Mansion House Jewish Committee it was reported that \$64,000 had been voted, of which \$27,000 had already been voted for emigration and other purposes. Of 228 families assisted the majority have gone to America.

Marriage in Spain. MADRID, March 23.—In the new law on marriage made in the Cortes civil and religious unions are to produce the same legal effects, but only from the moment they are duly inscribed on the civil register. All demands for nullity of marriage or for divorce can only be made before the ordinary civil tribunals, thus abolishing the jurisdiction of the ecclesiastical tribunals and of the Roman See. Breach of promise after the legal betrothal will give a right to damages to cover all the expenses incurred in the suit. Marriages duly contracted abroad will be held valid in Spain. The Catholic members and the bishops announce a formidable opposition to this law.

Remarkable Railroad Accident. This morning, near News Ferry, on the Richmond & Danville Railroad, Mr. Pat Dacey, the engineer on a freight train coming this way, became paralyzed. His fireman was outside of the cab at the time, and did not observe that he failed to blow his whistle on approaching the station. He then went to him and found him sitting down, paralyzed and unconscious. The fireman, in great alarm, closed the throttle and jumped off the locomotive, receiving some slight injuries at its own will, without guidance, and presently ran into the rear of another freight train coming this way. The collision threw several cars (said to be eight) from the track, doing considerable damage, the extent of which has not yet been ascertained. The paralyzed engineer was put on another train and brought out to Danville where his home is. He was not injured, as far as known, by the collision, but he remains unconscious from paralysis, and lies at his home here in a paralyzed condition.—Danville Register, 20th.

Prince Leopold's Annuity.

LONDON, March 23.—In the House of Commons today Mr. Gladstone moved an additional annuity of £10,000 for Prince Leopold and a pension of £6,000 yearly for his widow in the event of his death. Mr. Samuel Storey (radical) member for Sunderland, objected to spending the public money in support of titled idleness. Messrs. Labouchere, Broadhurst and Healy, advanced liberal aims, also opposed the grant. The motion was passed by a vote of 337 to 42. Sir Charles Dilke, Under Foreign Secretary, Right Hon Henry Fawcett, Postmaster General, and Mr. George Otto Trevelyan, Secretary to the Admiralty, abstained from voting.

LABORERS.

Kernersville News: There is a woman in this town who wears a No 14 shoe.—The tobacco market is booming at this place—large breaks every day and satisfactory prices obtained.

Rockingham Spirit: Fifty arrests were made by the Town Police since May last. The present town government has made more arrests, imposed and collected more fines and penalties than any of its predecessors; as an official statement soon to be made, will show.—A colored man, whose name we failed to learn, was brought to town and lodged in jail last Monday night by Deputy Sheriff D. D. Livingston, charged with capturing a buggy from a white man on the public highway in the lower part of this county.

High Point Pioneer: James M. Gere, of Belle Isle, N. Y., A. M. Farnum, of Boston, Mass., and W. S. Ball, of Greensboro, are in town looking after the interests of the Winston & Fayetteville Railroad.—We are reliably informed that the parties who bought the soapstone quarry near this place, are soon to commence operations, having purchased all the machinery necessary for that purpose.

Norwood Gleaner: We learn that considerable quantities of gold—from \$200 to \$500 worth per day—are being taken out at the Sam Christian mine, in Montgomery county.—The farmers are preparing for large crops of corn and cotton. The acreage of grain will be larger in this county this year than last, while that of cotton will not be diminished.—Be it said to the credit of our town, not a drop of intoxicating liquors are sold in its limits nor in the "region round about."

Greensboro Bugle: Last night about 3 o'clock a kerosene lamp exploded in the ladies' reception room at the depot, which came very near destroying the building. The carpet and several pictures were destroyed and the wall and ceiling considerably damaged. Times are surely getting hard, but the live-of dress still is apparent in the minds of the female portion of our population. We heard of one trying to place a pig in pawn for a dress this week. Pork generally wins, but the lady not being in the brokerage business, declined.

Salisbury Examiner: Mrs. Harris, of Davie, buried last Sunday, was 96 years old.—Mr. Samuel Frost, of Davie, is 98 years old.—Mrs. Queen of Davie, is 105 years old.—Mr. Carter, on his way to town last Monday, was approached by two negroes from the side of the road, one having in his hand an iron wedge which he offered to sell Mr. Carter for five cents. Mr. Carter agreed to take it, and drew out his pocket book to get the change. Just as he did so, the other negro rushed up, snatched the pocket book from Mr. C., and ran off. This occurred on the public highway, in open day light, not above a mile from this place. Both negroes have thus far escaped arrest.

Charlotte Observer: The dog war is carried bravely on, and a large number are daily going the way of all flesh.—Mr. James E. McDonald, who lives four miles from Charlotte, on the Beauty's Ford road, night before last had two mules stolen from his stables, and up to yesterday evening was unable to discover any trace whatever of the direction taken by the thief.—Several prominent farmers who left their homes early yesterday morning and came into the city, expressed fears that the wheat had been severely injured by the heavy frost of yesterday morning. The crop is much farther advanced than usual at this season of the year, much of it being up knee high, which is partly the result of superior cultivation, as well as of a mild winter, which has not been cold enough to check its growth.
