We learn that the bridge on the Richmond & Petersburg railroad, which crosses the James river near Richmond, Va., was burned yesterday afternoon. The fire caught sometime between 12 noon and 3 p. m. The train for the South which left Richmond at 11:50 a. m., yesterday, came across and was not delayed and in fact there was no fire at that time. The train which left the same place at 3 p. m. could not get across as the fire was then raging. We are happy to announce that the railroad authorities have made adequate arrangements for the transfer of all passengers, and that the latter will suffer no delay and but little inconvenience in being forwarded to their destinations. It is rumored that several tobacco warehouses which were situated between the bridge and the Tredegar Iron Works, were destroyed, but our information is not positive as to this latter matter.

EDITOR DAILY REVIEW:
The Spring session of the Wilmington Presbytery has been largely attended here, and is fully up to the usual mark in eloquence and ability of the ministers who have preached to large audiences, and in interest to the cause of religion. The beauty, learning, intellect, taste and piety here assembled from day to day since Thursday last, strikes every good man and true with admiration, force and lasting effect for good. The proverbial hospitality of the rising town of Burgaw was never more prominent and elegant. The hearts and doors of all citizens have been thrown open to the throngs in attendance, and every visitor is pleased with Burgaw. Since the suppression of the sale of liquor, Burgaw, it is evident to all, is more than ever on the increase in intelligence, refinement, good feeling and in substantial improvement and prosperity. New houses are continually going up and good people moving in.
Let us here relate a conversation we heard yesterday between a prominent lawyer in attendance from Duplin, who is a regular attendant upon our Courts also, and a local Presbyterian Minister here of talent and force. The lawyer stated his surprise and admiration at the magnificent assemblage of fashion, beauty, manhood, intelligence and piety and said it had put Burgaw high up in his estimation. The minister, ever ready at apt repartee, replied that it was not at all surprising when it was considered that religious occasions like the meeting now going on, drew out the better classes and higher order of society as to morals, gentility, learning and worth; whereas our crowds at our courts are mainly made up of criminals, vagabonds and the lower strata of society. The lawyer, evidently vanquished, was compelled to admit to the force and truth of the contrast, and left Burgaw with a higher opinion than ever of Pender.
