IN CONGRESS YESTERDAY.

SENATE. WASHINGTON, March 27.—Messrs Butler and Hampton presented memorials of the Charleston (S. C.) Chamber of Commerce, in favor of a free ship canal between the Chesapeake and Delaware bays.

At 5:20 P. M., the Senate adjourned. HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. Mr. Williams, of Mississippi, offered a resolution requesting the President to inform the House whether any protocol has been signed by Mr. Trescott, or any other diplomatic representative of the United States, setting forth the terms for ending the war in South America; and, if any such protocol has been signed, to furnish the House with a copy of the same, and also with copies of the correspondence relating thereto, not already communicated to one of the Houses of Congress. Adopted.

Father Feehan. LONDON, March 26.—At Rathdowney, county Queen's, on Saturday Rev. Mr. Feehan, a priest, was prosecuted for using seditious language. The charge was that he read at a meeting a paper purporting to be a statement of the Bishop of Nevada that if he (the Bishop of Nevada) had been imprisoned as a suspect he would have issued a manifesto calling the people to arms, instead of urging them to pay no rent.

GENERAL FOREIGN NEWS. LONDON, March 27, 1882.—Frederick Weber, the artist, dead. M. Bertall, the French caricaturist, is dead aged sixty-one years.

Railway Competition. LONDON, March 26, 1882.—In connection with the revived agitation for and alliance between the Grand Trunk and the Great Western Railway companies of Canada, the Observer in its financial article to-day, remarks that it is said that such an expression of opinion has been obtained from the main body of the Great Western proprietors as to insure a reversal of the present policy of the Board, so as to prevent injurious competition in future.

Longfellow. LONDON, March 26, 1882.—The Observer contains a feeling tribute to Longfellow, which concludes with the following words:—"It is scarcely too much to say that since the death of Byron no living English poet enjoyed so wide a popularity as Longfellow."

Disastrous Fire. RICHMOND, Va., March 26, 1882.—A disastrous conflagration occurred here to-day, which at one time threatened to encompass the destruction of as large a portion of the city as what was known as the "burnt district" at the time of the evacuation by the Confederate forces in 1865.

It includes several factories, buildings, dwelling houses and a lumber yard. HALF A MILLION DESTROYED. The total loss is now estimated at between \$500,000 and \$600,000, about half of which is covered by insurance.

Charlotte Observer: A big chicken fight is announced to take place near Concord on Easter Monday, with \$500 bet on the odd fight.—Charlie, the 10 year old son of Mr. John Yarboro, living near Buffalo Paper Mills, was killed by a runaway mule Thursday.
