RICHMOND, Va., March 26, 1882-A disastrous conflagration occurred here to day, which at one time threatened to encompass the destruction of as large a portion of the city as what was known as the "burnt district" at the time of the evacuation by the Confederate forces in 1865. About half-past twelve o'clock the southern end of the Petersburg ed in 1785. While thoroughly Demos Railroad bridge caught fire from sparks, as is supposed.
