The American Newspaper Directory, which will be issued next month by Geo-P. Rowell & Co., of New York, will contain the names of 10,611 periodicals in the UnitedStates andTerritories, which is a gain of 344 in the year just passed The number of daily papers has increased in somewhat larger proportions, and is now represented by a total of 996 against 921 in 1881. The largest increase has been in New York-10 dailies, 29 of all sorts. Illinois and Missouri show a percentage of gain which is even greater, while Colorado leads all others in the percentage of in crease, both in daily and weekly issues. California, Nevada, Oregon, South Carolina. Vermont and West Virginia have fallen behind 1881 in the total number of periodicals issued. In Georgia, Maine and Massachusetts the suspensions have exactly counterbalanced the new yentures. In every State not mentioned above, and in the Territories, there has
