It is announced, as might have been expected, that Mr. William H. Vanderbilt is not pleased with the marriage, but the young wife has already passed a long widowhood and she is entirely her own mistress as to her choice and fortune.

Fitz John Porter, who saved McClellan's army in front of Richmond and who was persecuted by Stanton and his gang, still suffers under a sentence which has been pronounced an outrage on decency and justice by a military commission.

A piteous reminiscence of Mr. Longfellow is related by Mr. G. W. Childs, who several years ago entertained the poet at dinner in Rome. He was walking to the diningroom with Mr. Childs, and on their way through the corridor of the hotel they passed a series of lighted wax candles placed in candelabra surrounded by flowers. Mr. Longfellow immediately shaded his face with his hand and begged his companion to hasten his footsteps. It was through the flame of a lighted candle, when in the act of melting some sealing wax, that Mrs. Longfellow was burnt to death.

Far pleasanter it is to be the receiver of an insurance company, enjoying terrapin and champagne, than a poor widow holding a policy therein, and having sorrow and poverty therewith. An investigation into the affairs of bankrupt insurance companies in the State of New York shows the enormous deficit of over \$7,000,000 on the part of officials of this class who represent seven companies only. In other words, out of assets amounting to \$10,234,570, which came into the hands of these worthies, only \$1,825,000 have paid out as dividends, with \$1,175,000 yet to be disbursed in that form, leaving a deficit of \$7,234,570 to be accounted for. This vast sum has been consumed in commissions, percentages, fees to lawyer, friends, coats, and the various other ways of getting rid of money so well understood by re-

civers of bankrupt companies and estates.

WHAT IS THE MATTER?

The anti-Chinese bill passed both Houses of Congress, and so far as legislation was concerned it became a law several days ago. It was duly forwarded to the President for his signature, and there it has remained ever since, and thus far, there are not the slightest indications of what he intends to do with it. Whether he will approve or veto it is a question which all may ask, but only he can answer, and he seems in no haste to relieve the public suspense. We hazard the opinion that the bill will not become a law by his signature, and if it ever goes on the statute book, it will be by the usual method after the expiration of the time the President is allowed to hold such documents in his possession.

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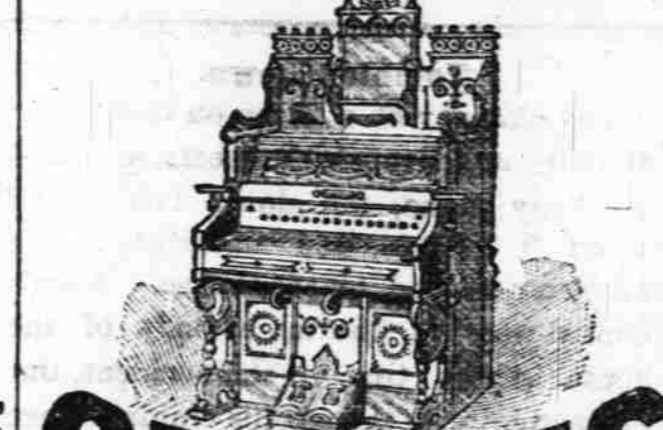
