

Mr. Longfellow's will was admitted to probate at Cambridge on Tuesday. R H. Dana, Jr., is appointed executor. The body of the document, which is characterized by brevity, is as follows : "I give sister Mrs. Anne L. Pierce, \$500 annually during life. I direct my executor to retain in hand property sufficient to yield the above sum every year, the principal to be finally distributed among my heirs. . I give \$500 to brother Samuel Longfellow during life; to each of the children of Stephen Longfellow \$1,000; \$5,000 to brother Alexander W. Longfellow ; \$1,000 to each child of G. W. Greene. The remainder of my property I give to the children in the same manner as the same would have descended to them by the statutes of distribution in this Common wealth had I died intestate."
