Encouraging.

A letter from a friend at Polkton, for several years past a subscriber to the Review, is full of warm encouragement for us, in our efforts to establish here a morning paper which shall be within the reach of every man who can read. Our correspondent also gives us some items of interest relative to matters at Polkton. He says: "We have at present a very glorious prospect for a heavy harvest of wheat, oats, &c. We have bought more cotton here this season than any previous year, since the existence of our lovely little town, though the grain crop last year was distressingly short, but farmers are getting along, owing to the favorable winter, a great deal better than expected. They are working and planting their crops now with a vim."

Active Preparation.

We are pleased to see active preparation going on tending towards the opening and improvement of the upper Cape Fear river, under the appropriation made by the last Congress. Four light draught flats are being built at the foot of Castle street, which are to be used in the river improvement. The work is going on under the supervision of Capt. E. P. Bowdoin, U. S. Government Inspector, who has been for some time past engaged in work on the Cape Fear river.

From Capt. Bowdoin we learn that the four flats, which are nearly completed, are to be 34 feet long by 14 wide, with a draught of about 10 inches. Two are to be used as quarters for the men engaged in the work, and two for removing logs which will be taken from the river. In addition to these flats is a larger one, 60 feet long by about 24 feet beam, on which will be erected a steam hoisting derrick and pile driver. It will be supplied with an 18 horse power engine, with a lifting capacity of 15 tons. The flats will be ready for use by the first of June, when work will be commenced on the river under the supervision of Capt. W. H. James, Engineer in charge.

We have received a communication from Mr. J. D. Devane, one of the gentlemen who were capsized in a boat with several ladies, a few Sundays ago, at Kelly's Cove, while returning from church, an account of which appeared in our paper a few days later. Mr. Devane's communication is too lengthy for our space. Perhaps there was a little injustice, unintentional, of course, done to Mr. Devane, but we gave the account just as we had received it. We are satisfied that all of the gentlemen acted with gallantry under the circumstances. Mr. Devane, as well as the others aiding in the rescue of the ladies.—The water was very deep at that point and the shore shelved abruptly, and but for the gallant conduct of the gentlemen the accident must have resulted in a sad disaster.

The "Lisbon" at Lisbon.

The village of Lisbon was made a scene of much excitement a few mornings since by the advent of the steamer Lisbon, and long before it had reached the banks of Coharie were thickly thronged with the inhabitants of the village and surrounding country, who had congregated there "with great expectations," to catch the first glimpse of the approaching steamer, being the first that had ever ploughed the still, dark waters of the Coharie, or had ever touched the wharf at the village of Lisbon. When the steamer did appear, wreathed with fleecy clouds of steam, she presented a picturesque view and sent many a thrill of pleasure through the crowd, as they contemplated what a great privilege was allowed them to live to see a real steamboat "sail up" the Coharie.

The village of Lisbon is quite a place of business.
