Grandpa is Going.

A loggerhead sea turtle, weighing 400 pounds and measuring six feet in length, and two feet, nine inches across the under shell, was caught in a sturgeon net at the fisheries of Messrs. W. E. Davis & Son, at New Inlet, on yesterday, and brought to this city. His turtleship is in the fish market of the new Market House, but will be shipped to New York on Monday. The turtle is by far the largest that has ever been caught about here, and looks as though it is the "old est and most respected citizen" of the waters of New Inlet.

A Test Trial.

Howard Relief Fire Engine Company, No. 1, has recently been supplied with new hose, and the members of the Company turned out yesterday with their steamer, the *Adrian*, for the purpose of testing it. The steamer was stationed at the corner of Fourth and Orange streets, and the water drawn from the hydrant located at that point. The result was entirely satisfactory, throwing a stream through 950 feet of hose with a one inch nozzle, 155 feet by actual and careful measurement. This was accomplished with a steam pressure of 100 and a water pressure of 220 pounds.—There were some slight leaks at the joints of the hose, which may be accounted for on account of its being new; otherwise, the hose was entirely satisfactory.

No. 13 and the Little Thing.

A little male bovine about 2 years old made Officer Griffith, No. 13 on the police force, sit and down Fourth street on yesterday morning. No. 13 attempted to shoo the little thing off the sidewalk but the little yearling put himself on the defensive, gave a snort, shook his head, pawed the ground, and pitched in after No. 13 with more haste than the poor policeman relished. He started off on Mand S. time with that little yearling right behind him. As he approached Market street he shouted out to "No. 8 who happened to be passing: "Here we come, darn our fool souls, head us off."
