Board of Medical Examiners.
The next meeting of this Board will be held at Concord, N. C., on Monday, May 8th, 1882. It will be necessary for applicants for examination to bring satisfactory evidence of good moral character, and that they have arrived at the age of 21 years. Without a license to practice from this Board no physician, who has commenced practice since April 15th, 1859, can collect his fees by law.

Rev. Dr. Andrews.
Rev. John N. Andrews, D. D., of Goldsboro, preached yesterday morning in Front Street M. E. Church, and at night in Fifth Street Church to very large congregations on both occasions. There are some few matters yet to be arranged, however, after which the road will be turned over to the Wilmington & Weldon R. R. Co. and by them declared open and a schedule established. Capt. Barry thinks this will take place about the first of May.

Rev. T. DeWitt Talmage.
