We are glad to learn that so far the  
fruit crop in this section promises to be  
unusually large and fine. The recent  
cold snap did not affect the peach  
blossoms hereabouts.

Steamboatmen who arrived in the city  
this morning from Fayetteville report  
that there was a rise of about 18 inches  
in the river on Sunday, and that it was  
still slightly on the increase.

The frame for the new hotel at  
Smithville was carried down yester-  
day and the work of erecting it was com-  
menced to-day. Capt. Perry says that this  
house will be finished and ready for the  
reception of guests by the first of June.

A gentleman from the interior of the  
State, who was in the city yesterday,  
tells us that the fruit crop, as far as  
his observation has extended, has been  
injured but very little, if any, by the  
recent frosts, a fact which we are very  
glad to learn.

On and after May 1st, the boats of

new stone pier, No. 1, North River. It

The committee on membership were  
requested to invite the proprietors of the  
local sawmills, cotton mills, rice mills and  
tobacco factories to become members of

the managers to include in the Secreta-  
ry's duties the daily preparation of full  
statistics in these branches of trade in  
the hope that such information may add  
materially to the benefit of the Exchange  
and to the prosperity of this market.

The annual assessment for each member  
of the Exchange was continued at \$25.  
A day's delivery of guano in bulk by  
vessels or otherwise was fixed at 50 tons  
minimum where no specified amount has  
been agreed upon.

The special committees on Railroads  
and Fire Insurances were continued.

The membership of the Exchange now  
numbers 43, and the Treasurer's report,  
together with the daily attendance of  
merchants, indicates a degree of pros-  
perity which has never before been at-  
tained.
