The receipts of cotton at this port
to-day foot up 128 bales.

Schooner *Ella Frances*, Balger,
cleared at Baltimore April 17th for this
port.

There was one case of drunk and down

German barque *Eintracht*, Musevith
and Norwegian barque, *Gobt*, Svendsen,
sailed from Maasuis, April 1st., for this
port.

The storm signal was displayed here
to-day. The wind came from the South,
and the atmosphere has been sultry and
unpleasant.

Nor. barque *Folkefesten*, Hadland,
cleared at this port to-day for Grenock
Scotland, with 3,843 barrels tar, shipped
by Messrs Robinson & King.

Something over 300 tickets have al-
ready been sold for Dr. Talmage's lec-
ture at the Opera House to-morrow
night. This is the largest number of
seats which have been taken at any one
time during the season.

Mr. B. F. Swann, of the C. M. Stead-
man No. 1, Fire Company, won the
gold badge of the company for the year
1881. The badge, which is said to be of
very handsome design, will be presented
to Mr. Swann on the night of the 3rd
proximo.

The beneficial department of the In-

Daughters of Samaria, colored, paid its
third endowment last night to Isaac
Johnson, colored, as the beneficiary of
his wife, Diana Johnson, who died about
two months since. The amount of the
endowment was \$200.

The Gale.
The maximum velocity of the wind up
to 4 o'clock to-day, was 28 miles per
hour, and this was between 2 and 3
o'clock this afternoon. At Smithville
the maximum velocity was 34 miles per
hour. No damage has been reported
along the coast.

John's Church, in this city, who is now
located at Palestine, Texas, has received
a call to St. Paul's Church, Mobile, a
large and wealthy parish. He has not
yet decided whether he will remain at

time he expects to travel in Mexico for
a few weeks, leaving Palestine this week.

county; the Declaimer's medal to Mr.

Essayist's medal to Mr. H. H. Williams,
of Gates county. All the gentlemen
named are reported as having made fine
efforts in their respective departments
and to have acquitted themselves with
much credit.

There have been many and decided
improvements made in the railroad shops
in this city. In a very short time there
will not be a vestige of the old shops
left. New and handsome buildings are
being erected to take the places of the
old ones. The yard is being very much
enlarged and the appointments and con-
veniences will be second to none in the
South.

Another Steam Tug.
Through the courtesy of Mr. Haney,
of the signal office, we learn that the
steam tug *Italian* arrived at Smithville
this morning from New York, where she
has recently been purchased by her pre-
sent owner, Mr. J. T. Harper. She will
be used in the future for towing pur-
poses on the Cape Fear. In size and gen-
eral appearance the *Italian* much resem-
bles the steam tug *Blanche*, which is
well known in these waters.

Rev. Mr. Brown.
We received a very pleasant visit this
morning from the Rev. Thos. W. Brown,
formerly of this city, but now of New
York, whose arrival here we mentioned
last week. Mr. Brown has been for a
number of years past on the editorial
staff of the *World* but has recently, and
just previous to his ordination, resigned
his position on the staff of that paper.
He leaves here to-morrow night on his
return but will stop over for a few days
in Richmond, where he has an engage-
ment to preach next Sunday.

The Police Pay.
The police force of this city consists
of 25 privates, 8 sergeants and 1 cap-
tain. The pay of this force has been
\$60 per month for the captain, \$1.60
per day for the sergeants and \$1.50 per
day for the privates. Lately this has
been reduced 10 cents per day on ser-
geants and privates, and \$5 per month
on the captain, thus making the mag-
nificent saving to the tax payers, at the
expense of what is really an excellent
police force, of \$2.96 per day. The
pay of the force was advanced last Fall
to the extent it has now been curtailed
and this action, if we remember correctly,
was because of the large advance in all
of the necessities of life. If this is
correct the same reasons hold good now,
and with an added force. Supplies have
not only maintained the advance, but
some of the prime articles of life are
higher now than they were during the
winter months.

It is to be regretted that the authori-
ties have thought it necessary to lop off
now the small advance made last Fall,
and we hope that they may reconsider
the action they have taken. The police
force, as now constituted, is composed
of good men, and the pay, at the best,
is but miserably small for the services
required of the men. The duties are
not only onerous, but they are oftentimes
dangerous, and \$1.60 a day is not by
any means large pay for men who tramp
all day, or all night, as the case may be.
The difference is a very small one in the
aggregate to the treasury of a city of
nearly 20,000 inhabitants, and whose
finances are in such a satisfactory con-
dition, but it is a matter of importance,
it may be of vital importance, to each
member of the force. We believe that
the tax payers of Wilmington will en-
dorse these remarks, and we must again
express the hope that the action of the
authorities will be reconsidered.

Just on the eve of going to press we
are informed by telephone that more of
our type has arrived and is at the depot
having got here on the through freight
this afternoon. It is not all
but it will prove enough to get
out with at first. To facilitate
this we will suspend the publication of
the *DAILY REVIEW* until Sunday morn-

The Aurora.
The aurora borealis which was seen
here last Sunday night, to which refer-
ence has been made, was visible pretty
generally over this and adjoining States.
It was a rare sight, and as magnificent
as it was rare. One who beheld it fur-
nishes the following graphic description
for publication:

It was a very beautiful display, and is
pronounced by those who saw it to be
one of the most magnificent exhibitions
witnessed here for many years. Unfor-
tunately, the spectacle occurred late at
night, and comparatively few people
enjoyed the rare privilege of seeing it.
The first evidences of the aurora were
seen between 10 and 11 o'clock, in what
resembled a broad arch in the northwest.
Towards midnight the whole northern
heavens presented an appearance of var-
iegated lights—red, white and blue.
From the horizon were sent up tongues
or columns of red and white lights,
which ascended to the zenith and disap-
peared. At times great shafts of light
shot up with surprising rapidity, pre-
sented a scene that was both grand and
awe inspiring: At times the northern
heavens presented a deep red appearance,
as though the light of some great fire,
were reflected from the skies. As the
night advanced the aurora lights increas-
ed until they spread away round to the
east. It was not until near the dawn of
day that they disappeared. The specta-
cle was one long to be remembered by
all who saw it.
