The Clarendon Water Works Company are laying new pipe in many portions of the city, and Mr. Chase is kept busy trying to fill orders promptly.

The Water Works Company have had a force of hands employed for the last few days in laying pipe along North Water street, between Market and Chestnut.

The river from the mouth to the city is being surveyed under the supervision of Mr. H. Bacon, U. S. Engineer in charge of the River and Harbor Improvements.

The family of Mr. McGann, Chief Officer of the Signal Office in this city, has moved among us and is stopping at Mr. W. H. Sterling's. We wish them a pleasant sojourn.

The steamer Clinton, Gray, arrived here from Bannerman's Bridge, on the Northeast river, on Friday evening. She will run regularly hereafter between that point and this city.

Capt. Wicks, of the schooner Minnie, which went ashore on Frying Pan Shoals, speaks very highly of the conduct of the crew of Life Saving Station No. 25, at the mouth of the river.

Capt. Brock was out yesterday afternoon with a section of hose washing front street and flush-ing the gutters. He says it beats "threes" or even "two pairs"—of brooms. We straight-ened out and left.

The steam tug Italian commenced operation on the river yesterday. Since her arrival she has been undergoing some little alterations which were thought advisable by her owners. 'Rah for the Italian—Harpers.

Bishop Lyman. Bishop Lyman reached this city in the course of his visitation of the Diocese on Friday night, and is the guest of Dr. W. G. Thomas. The following are his appointments for this city:—Sunday, April 23, 11 a. m., St. John's; 5 p. m., St. James'; 8 p. m., St. Paul's. Tuesday, April 25, 8 p. m., St. Mark's (colored). The Bishop expects to visit St. Philip's on the morning of Tuesday.

Her Summer Dress. The steamer Passport will be laid up to-morrow and thoroughly overhauled, preparatory to resuming her Summer schedule. Captain Harper proposes to make her as comfortable as possible and will spare no pains or expense to accomplish his ends. The handsome little craft will do double duty this Summer. As soon as the hotel at Smithville is completed she will make two round trips a day.

New Saw Mill, Railroad, etc. A large and very handsome saw mill is being built at Black Creek, on the W. & W. R. R., for Messrs J. W. R. J. & R. R. Taylor, with the latter gentleman as manager. The mill will have a capacity of 30,000 feet per day. In addition to the saw mill will be a planing mill and grist mill. A railroad of about ten miles and a half in length, running through a fine original forest, has been surveyed. Three miles and a half of the road have been graded and the ties were laid on Friday. The rails will be placed in position as fast as the ties are laid. A handsome new engine, the "R. J. Taylor," has been purchased and will be ready to be put on the track as soon as the rails are laid. We wish the gentlemen all success in their enterprise.

We are requested to state that owing to the nightly practice of the Arion Society for their Concert on Tuesday, May 2nd, there will be no rehearsal for the opera of Billee Taylor during the ensuing week.

Exports Foreign. Norwegian brig San Juan, Bache, cleared to-day for Hull, England, with 325 casks spirits turpentine and 2,325 barrels rosin, shipped by Messrs. Alex. Sprunt & Son; Swedish barque Cometen, Hallgreen, cleared for Riga, Russia, with 4,577 barrels rosin, shipped by the same parties.

Handsome Car. A handsome U. S. Postal railway car has just been built at the shops of the Wilmington & Waldon R. R. in this city. The car is now receiving the finishing touches and will be ready for use in a few days. It is very handsome and reflects much credit upon those who built and painted it.

Magistrate's Court. Elijah Adams was brought before Justice Mills on a peace warrant, sworn out by Mary Adams. The complaint was withdrawn, and the costs paid by the prosecutrix.

Joe Chadbourne was then brought up, charged with an assault and battery upon Elijah Adams. The defendant submitted, paid the costs and was discharged.

Martin's Railroad. E. F. Martin had \$1,495 subscribed to his Sound railroad to-day. He is daily in receipt of letters of tangible encouragement and feels sanguine as to the successful result of his labors. We were shown several letters received by him, written evidently by business men, at the North and elsewhere giving him encouragement and taking stock in his enterprise. Martin is the only colored man in the country who has undertaken so great an enterprise, and we trust he may succeed.

What we Drink. We have received the "Annual Report of the North Carolina Agricultural Experiment Station, for 1881." It is a carefully compiled report, and shows that much patient labor has been bestowed upon it in order to secure correctness. In a perusal of its varied contents, we were astonished at the fact developed that there was hardly any pure water in Wilmington. Out of 40 samples sent from this city for analysis, there were but two which were pronounced pure, one of which was taken from the tank of Mr. H. Westermann, and the other from the well of Dr. J. C. Walker. The water from these two places was pronounced remarkably pure. The water from the well of Mr. Walker Meares was pronounced good, as was that also from a cistern of Mr. A. K. Walker. The other samples ranged from fairly good to dangerous and abominable.
