THE SOUTH CAROLINA CASES.

The News and Courier does not mince matters when speaking of the conduct of the election cases in South Carolina. Here is a little cranberry sauce which it serves with its comments on District-Attorney Melton's course in the Sumter cases:

The District Attorney, in carrying out on Saturday the bargain he and his assistant, Mr. Dallas Sanders, had made with the special representative of the two commissioners of election for Sumter county, pleaded guilty himself, in open court, to the crime of prosecuting reputable citizens without reasonable cause, and, out of his own mouth, gave the lie to his flowery professions of fairness and liberality in the discharge of his official duty.

In intruding for an admission of culpability by those whom he knew and declared to be innocent, Mr. Melton exposed to public sight the plans of his task-masters, and brings discredit and reproach upon the Government as well as upon himself.

In reference to the case of Mr. Joseph B. Bates, of Barnwell county, and the gross perjury of the witnesses introduced by the prosecution, it says: Five negro witnesses for the prosecution went upon the stand and swore positively that the defendant had voted at three polls in Barnwell county, nine miles apart, at the election in 1880. They swore that they had been acquainted with Mr. Bates for years, and knew him well.
