THE INDIAN OUTRAGES. The dispatch sent by certain citizens of Arizona, whose neighbors and friends had just been murdered in cold blood by the devilish savages, to President Arthur and his Cabinet, directed to them while on their junketing tour to Fortress Monroe, illustrates more than one fact of potent interest to the people of this country.

These outrages could have been averted and many valuable lives saved had a wise and just policy prevailed. The administration at Washington is, in a great measure, responsible for these things, and it is terrible to think that they have gone off on a pleasure with the cries of murdered men, women and children ascending to Heaven against them.

A sight shocking enough to make a life-long impress of horror was that beheld by Stanislaus Metas, a boy of nine who saw the Apaches crush with stones the heads of his mother and two brothers and torture his father to death.

The Indian outbreak in Arizona has already resulted in the death of forty persons, although it cannot be said to have been unexpected. Last September a number of Indian scouts fired on Gen. Willcox's command at Fort Apache. They were surrendered by the Indians on the promise of a fair trial. Three were tried and sentenced to be hanged, and meanwhile nothing was done in the cases of the others, who were chaffing under confinement. The Indians could not understand the delay. It looked to them like treachery, and they got the idea into their heads that it was the intention to kill all the prisoners, a few at a time. Indian Agent Tiffany telegraphed to Washington begging that the execution of the three should be postponed until the others should either have been tried or released, and predicting trouble should this not be done; but the sentence was carried out on March 3. The Indians now declare that they intend to kill all the people they can in revenge for the hanging of the three Indians.

Senator Hill, of Georgia, is yet very feeble, notwithstanding the many favorable reports which have been made regarding him. He has been an intense sufferer, and, although strong hopes are entertained for his recovery, we fear the worst. Repeated torturing operations have failed to eradicate the disease, and each has left him in a much more precarious condition.

Magnificent preparations are being made at Windsor Castle for the approaching marriage of Leopold, Duke

of Albany, Queen Victoria's youngest son, to the Princess Helena of Waldeck. The latter, accompanied by her father, has arrived in England, and has been received with demonstrations of joy.

NOON TELEGRAMS.

THE INDIANS. Minute Men Organizing in Bowie County—Report of the Massacre at Galeyville a Canard.

[By Telegraph to Daily Review.] SAN FRANCISCO, April 27.—Noon.—A Tombstone dispatch says a meeting has been held by citizens of Bowie county, and minute men organized for the protection of the town against the Indians. The report of the capture of Galeyville and killing of 35 persons is incorrect, as only one man was killed, and he was three miles from the town. There are 2 companies of troops at Galeyville, and the Indians did not attack the place.

Blaine and Belmont.

[By Telegraph to Daily Review.] WASHINGTON, April 25.—Noon.—At the close of Mr. Belmont's cross examination of Mr. Blaine, a most exciting and unusual scene occurred in the Foreign Affairs Committee Rooms. Mr. Blaine said that Mr. Belmont, after being warned on Monday, had persisted in entirely misquoting his despatches and putting upon them a construction utterly foreign to them. He was compelled to change his opinion of him which had heretofore been that that he was a gentleman. An exciting colloquy ensued, which the committee were unable to interrupt. Mr. Belmont intimated that he would deal with Mr. Blaine in private and followed it up with the words: "I believe that you are a bully and a coward." Mr. Blaine, addressing the committee, and ignoring Mr. Belmont, replied: "Mr. Chairman, this young man has disgraced himself. He has been put forward by those who are behind him to insult me but he is incapable of doing so." The scene was almost remarkable one notwithstanding the efforts of the chairman to smooth the troubled waters and obviate the necessity for any misunderstanding. The impression prevailed at the adjournment of the meeting, that the dispute was by no means ended. It will be the subject of comment upon all sides this afternoon.
