Fire at Rocky Point.

Masonboro Turnpike.
A meeting of the friends of the Masonboro Turnpike was held at the Bank of New Hanover last night. Estimates of cost and time to complete the road were made and the matter of material for hardening the road was taken into consideration. A committee, consisting of Messrs. W. L. Smith, Jr., Geo. A. Peck and Dr. W. W. Harris was appointed to solicit estimates of cost, etc., and to report at an adjourned meeting to be held next week.

Checkedmate.
Officer McCall, of the police force, checkedmate last night a couple of young rogues in an effort to rob a bale of cotton on Market street, standing in front of the store of Capt. J. B. Huggins. They were armed with weapons for the warfare, and evidently had visions of a big haul when the officer put in an appearance, took a bag from one of them, and proceeded to administer a well merited chastisement. The little rascals, who were only about seven years of age, started off on a brisk run up street, and all that could be seen of them was a blue streak, one hundred yards long, of scared small boys, but McCall was after them—and legs will tell—and watched the small boy with the bag to such an extent as to accelerate his speed to Jack Rabbit schedule.

Library Association.
There was a full attendance at the meeting of the Library Association held at the rooms of the Association last night. After a free and full discussion it was decided to add three members to the Board of Directors, and the following gentlemen from the Library Club were announced as Directors: Messrs. James Fair, J. G. H. Smith, and M. S. Willard. Committees to revise the constitution, solicit membership, and take into consideration the most feasible means of raising funds were appointed.

There was a free exchange of ideas, and it is thought that the result of the deliberations of the meeting will be conducive to the welfare and prosperity of the Association. So may it be.

A Suit Worth Gaining.
In the Superior Court at New York yesterday, Mrs. Verena M. Chapman was awarded a verdict for \$21,047.73 against the Phoenix National Bank, of that city, the value of bonds and stock the bank confiscated during the war on the ground that she was friendly to the Southern cause. Mrs. Chapman is well known in this city where she taught school previous to the war, and to her marriage, when she was Miss Verena Moore. She is now the wife of Rev. Dr. Chapman, a Presbyterian divine, and we are glad to be able to chronicle her success in the suit.

Freaks of the Wind.
One of our correspondents in Pender county tells us of some of the remarkable freaks of the tornado which passed through sections of that county on Saturday last. At Mr. B. J. Bordeaux's place a very heavy cannon ball, weighing 56 pounds, which he kept in the front yard, was carried by the wind a distance of forty yards; and a colored boy about ten years of age was taken up bodily by the wind, lifted into the air and carried over the stables and landed about a hundred yards beyond, sans coat, sans breeches, and, in fact, sans everything he had on save the collar of his shirt and the waistband of his trousers, and these were so black with dirt that the wind may be pardoned for having left them behind, under the impression that they were a part of his natural cuticle.

Wilmington and Baltimore.
A REVIEW reporter met yesterday a gentleman from Baltimore who has been for many years connected with the steamship lines from Baltimore to Southern ports. He informed us that there were capitalists in Baltimore who were now ready and willing to put on five steamers, two to run between Baltimore and Wilmington, and two between Baltimore and Charleston, and the fifth to run alternately to Charleston and Wilmington as the business might require. This gentleman says that it will be necessary for a portion of the capital to be raised here in Wilmington.

We sincerely hope that some action may be taken in this direction for such a line of steamers would be of great benefit to Wilmington and would, we are sure, divert a considerable portion of the freight on the upper part of the Carolina Central Railroad to this city which without this line would seek an outlet via Portsmouth to Baltimore. Every encouragement should be given to this scheme, and we know of no better way than through the Chamber of Commerce, the Produce Exchange and the Board of Trade. We have nothing to lose in this movement, and much indeed to be gained, and we hope that our suggestion may be the means of putting the ball in motion, and that soon we may be able to report favorably. In 1866-7-8-9 and 70 there was a fine business done between Baltimore and Wilmington, and why not anticipate a business for hereafter larger than at that time? Let our enterprising merchants put their shoulders to the wheel, and success will crown their efforts.

About a Wilmingtonian.
It is always a pleasure for us to chronicle the success of a Wilmingtonian, and we publish herewith the following complimentary notice taken from the Atlanta Constitution of the 23d inst.:
The people of Atlanta will regret to learn that Professor Agostini will not give any of his delightful entertainments at DeGives this summer. During the three seasons that Professor Agostini has been here the entertainments which he has given have been among the best amateur performances ever presented here, and have been universally enjoyed. Since his return from Wilmington, N. C., he has been overwhelmed with the duties of his academy, and will not have time to arrange for any of his pleasant entertainments further than the usual Friday soirees and Saturday matinees at his academy. It is a pleasure to his friends to see him making money, but it is a source of regret that they are thereby deprived of a large share of his society. Personally Professor Agostini is one of the most popular men in our city, and is one of the most perfect gentlemen one would meet in a year's travel. He had Faith Among Doubt-ers.
Samuel E. Palmer, a young employee in the Gents' Furnishing Store of T. Miller, No. 355 Sixth ave., New York City, has invested regularly in the Drawings of the Louisiana State Lottery by sending to M. A. Dauphin, New Orleans, La. He failed to get a ticket in the February drawing, as he sent too late, but received one in the March distribution. He was laughed at by his friends, but he offered to bet \$100 that he would some day win a large prize. Sure enough he found that his was a half of ticket No. 6099, which had drawn \$5,000. He collected it through Adams Express Company, and as he has frequently drawn small prizes of \$20 and \$10 before, will send in time for May 9th, to be in the next drawing under the special supervision of Gen'l G. T. Beauregard of La., and Jubal A. Early of Va., as usual.

Testing Hydrants and Hose.
One thousand feet of new hose were tested at the corner of Front and Dock streets yesterday afternoon, under the supervision of Capt. F. G. Robinson, Chief of the Fire Department. Five hundred feet have been apportioned to the Cape Fear Steam Fire Engine Company, No. 3, and the remainder has been reserved for an especial purpose. The hose was found to be as represented. In testing the hose a test of the fire hydrant was also made. Five hundred feet was attached to the hydrant, and five hundred to the engine. At a given signal the water was turned on at the hydrants, and the engine commenced to pump. A stream was thrown from the hydrant one minute before the engine threw a stream. The test as to distance was made with 1 and 1-1/2 inch nozzles. The hydrant threw the water further through the 1-1/2 inch nozzle than the engine did through the inch. The test was entirely satisfactory, and proved conclusively that the hydrants would beat any engine in the country in getting on the first stream. The engine carried 115 pounds water pressure, and the water works 90 pounds.
