TERRIBLE DISASTER.
Fearful Loss of Life on Wateree River, S. C.—Steamboat Explosion—List of Killed and Wounded.
A terrible steamboat disaster, attended with the loss of several lives, occurred at about 9 o'clock yesterday morning on the Wateree river, about nine miles from Eastover, S. C. The Agent of the Wilmington, Columbia & Augusta Railroad at Eastover furnishes the following particulars relative to the catastrophe:
A party of ladies and gentlemen, consisting of 25 or 30 persons, at Bate's Landing, this morning, went on board the government steamer *Marion*, which is engaged in clearing out the Wateree river, for a short excursion. After getting fairly under way the boat was hailed and returned for some passengers who had been left. Getting those on board, she again started on her trip. When she had gotten a short distance, steam was shut off in passing a sharp bend in the river, and after getting around the bend, the captain rang the bell to go ahead, when the engineer turned on the steam which was immediately followed by a terrific boiler explosion, instantly killing Misses Fannie Henry, Minnie Henry, Mattie E. Henry, Messrs Orville Street and Tom Richardson, and mortally wounding Misses Lizzie Henry, Minnie Bates, Messrs John E. Eason and Willie Tremble and John Williams, colored. Misses Jessie Stock, Nettie Rawlinson, Carrie Bates, Lue Tremble, Mrs. Sam. Garner, Mr. Willie Williams and several others whose names were not ascertained were slightly wounded. The bodies of those who were killed had not been recovered when the report closed. The boat is a total loss.

The unfortunate man was placed in an ambulance and conveyed to the Marine Hospital where he will remain until he is able to go to work again.
New Gas Machine.
Capt. B. F. Perry now has the Purcell illuminated with gas of his own manufacture. He has placed a Lay gas machine in the back yard of the building and illuminated the building last night for the first time with the gas. It makes a strong, steady light and seems to give entire satisfaction. The machine has a 200 light capacity and generates gas without heat or fire, but by the pressure of air from a pump and tank. The patentees assert that the cost of manufacturing the gas will not exceed \$1 per 1,000 feet.

Anniversary of the Big Fire.
To-day is the 39th anniversary of the great fire which swept through a large and populous portion of the town of Wilmington, on the 30th day of April, 1843. A coincidence lies in the fact that it occurred on Sunday. It broke out about 10:30 o'clock, while the people were at church, and within two hours the disaster was complete. The fire caught from a spark from the chimney of the old Cape Fear Bank (now National Bank) building, which fell upon the rotten shingles on the roof of an old warehouse on the alley just in rear of the building now occupied by Otterbourg's clothing house, on Front street. The wind was blowing very fiercely at the time, and nearly due South. The town was swept by the flames, all North of Princess street and between Front street and the river, and the buildings on the East side of Front street, North of Princess, having been reduced to ashes. The fire was a very disastrous one and for a time almost paralyzed the energies of the thrifty little town.
