## Anniversary.

The Association of Officers of the Third N. C. Infantry celebrated their 16th anniversary yesterday at the residence of Capt. W. A. Cumming and W. H. Northrop, on Greenville Sound. The day was passed very pleasantly and the committee of arrangements were universally commended for the manner in which they had prepared for the occasion. Letters were read from Ex-President Davis, Gen. W. R. Cox and Rev. A. DeR. Meares. There were fourteen members present, and among them several non-residents. ## Supreme Lodge Knights of Honor.

This body met in Baltimore, May 9, and was called to order by Supreme Dictator W. B. Hoke. From his annual report we collect the following for the good of the Order: "This is the ninth annual session. During the period of the existence of the Order, \$5,967,003 had been paid on 3,065 deaths, called for by 98 assessments. During the fiscal year ending April 29, 1882, the sum of 2,211,135 has been for death claims. To pay this sum 18 assessments have been required, an actual cost to each member (age 45 years and under) of \$9 per thousand dollars for a safe and reliable insurance. Within the period of one year, 25,000 new members have been initiated and 335 new lodges instituted. The present membership is 146,500. All monies paid into Supreme Treasury from assessments, is known as the Widow and Orphan's Benefit Fund. It is held separate and distinct by Subordinate and Supreme Lodges, and is sacredly applied to the payment of death benefits; it can be used for no other purpose.
