**Champion Cigar Factory.**  
We dropped into the Champion Cigar Factory on yesterday and found all hands up to their eyes in work and somewhat behind in their orders. Messrs Brunhill & Bro. tell us that they contemplate putting on from 15 to 20 more hands, and in order to secure this Mr. I. Hirschburg, the foreman of the factory, will leave here for the North to-night to engage and bring the hands back with him. The capacity of the factory, when working full force, is 50,000 cigars per week. Different grades of cigars are made in the factory. *News and Observer:* Died on yesterday, the 15th inst., at 6 a. m., Miss Louisa M. Hill, oldest daughter of the late Wm. Hill, Esq., former Secretary of State, in the 78th year of her age, from debility consequent upon advanced age.

*Asheville Citizen:* Reports of the wheat crops in this section come in with unusual encouragement. There is no dissent from the general verdict that it is the best crop ever seen here.

*Greensboro Bugle:* A daughter of Henry Barringer, of Warnersville, aged about twelve years, died yesterday under very painful circumstances. She was studying her Sunday School lesson Saturday night, when the lamp was overturned, and she was burned to such an extent that she died the next day.

*Greensboro News:* Mike Walkingstick, Saggi Jackson and Anderson Miller, convicted at Asheville court for breaking into a government warehouse, and sentenced to two years in Buffalo (N. Y.) Penitentiary, were brought down by the officers last Saturday night and lodged in jail here. The two first named are full-blooded Cherokee Indians, and can speak but very little English.

*Durham Plant:* It is thought the Democratic Convention for this, the 5th, Judicial District, will be held on the 4th of July. Prof. Burcham died at his residence in the eastern part of Durham Friday evening, the 12th inst., after a brief illness. He came to America from England only some six months ago. Since in Durham he had been engaged in teaching in the school of Dr. Dean, proving himself to be a ripe scholar and fine instructor.

*Robesonian:* Dr. R. Vampill, of this town, is having some unfortunate experience with Mr. Daniel F. Beatty, the celebrated piano and organ fraud. Several months ago he sent Mr. Beatty an order for a piano, and like is the prompt paying man that he is, he sent the money with the order. He is one of both yet, and likely to remain so. Mr. J. S. McQueen, of Shoe Heel, returned home on the morning of the 6th inst., with his bride, Miss Lucy Butler, of Richmond, Va.—Mr. Daniel McCaskill, of Cumberland county, and father of Mr. J. C. McCaskill, of Shoe Heel, died at his residence on Tuesday, the 9th inst.—He was in his 90th year, but his death was hastened by a fall which fractured one of his limbs. He was a native of Scotland.
